In accordance with the celebration of the 100 Anniversary of the Federation Cynologique Internationale, the General Committee of the FCI reviewed its Mission and Vision Statements and Values to maintain our leadership worldwide.

Mission statement

The FEDERATION CYNOLOGIQUE INTERNATIONALE (FCI) is the supreme authority of the canine culture worldwide. The FCI is responsible for safeguarding canine health and international dog activities to enhance the relations between dogs and humans. Established in 1911 the FCI includes 90 members and contract partners (one member per country). Each member issues their own pedigrees and train highly qualified judges. The FCI makes sure that the pedigrees and judges are mutually recognised by all the FCI members, contract partners and any person involved in their domestic canine scene.

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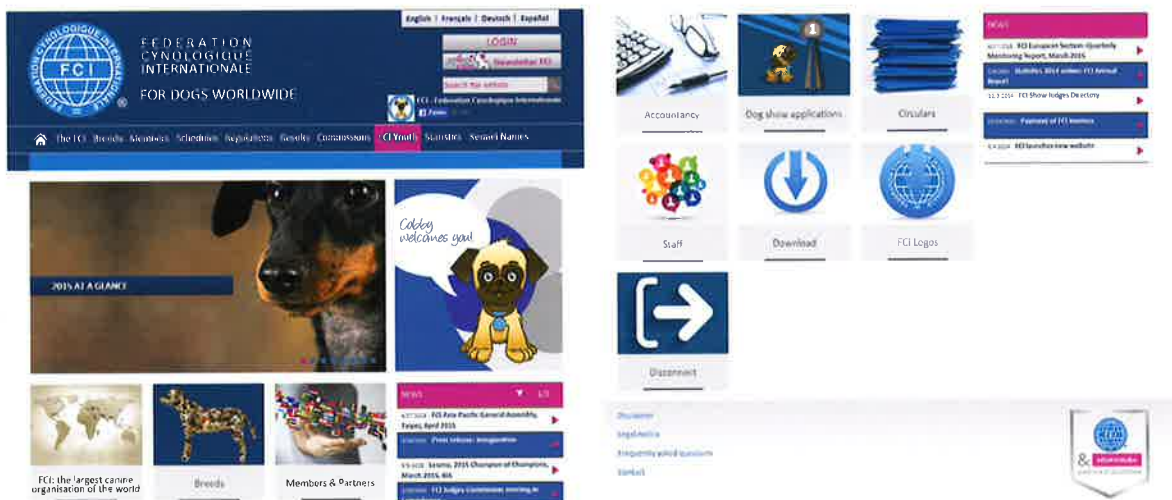
EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Dear Readers,

Another year is gone! 2014 was an intense year for the FCI Staff with the building of the new extension, which will allow us to have our own meeting room, our library/museum and a very spacious room for old archives. As you can imagine, this caused daily troubles and discomfort, but the final result was really worth all these efforts!



Another big challenge that we faced, successfully, was the creation of our brand-new website. As all of you have seen, it is modern, user-friendly, nicely designed and offers different online tools to our members (dog show applications, accountancy, circulars, specific forms to download, etc.). In addition, the show results are online and any exhibitor or breeder can consult them at any time. The next step is to extend those online services (kennel names applications, applications for the title of International Champion, etc.).





In 2014, several Executive Committee meetings took place (where a President of an FCI Section was specifically invited to discuss about matters proper to his Section), together with General Committee meetings. In addition, in January, it was agreed to have a friendly but very interesting meeting with the Boards of the American Kennel Club and Canadian Kennel Club. An overview of the conclusions reached was published on our Website.

In 2014, the cooperation contract between the FCI and Eukanuba had to be revised following the different changes in the structure of the latter (new owners are Mars and Spectrum). The terms of the contract did not change and the cooperation will keep for a minimum of 3 years.

Regarding the other cooperation opportunities, the FCI decided to stop issuing a "paper" magazine and instead to collaborate with HOTdog Magazine, as a complement to our existing online Newsletter (www.dogdotcom.be), Facebook page (FederationCynologiqueInternationale) and of course website (www.fci.be).

■ FCI SCIENTIFIC COMMISSION - Activity report

Official Meeting

During the period under review, the FCI Scientific Commission met on 4-5 April in Amsterdam (The Netherlands).

On the first meeting day, the Scientific Commission discussed health and genetic issues raised either by the General Committee of the FCI or by the FCI member countries. In addition, the commission initiated its own ideas and recommendations regarding topics relevant to health improvement for pure bred dogs

The second day was dedicated to mutual discussions with the FCI Standards Commission on items relevant to new standards, change in standards or health impairment due to standards and on proposal of new regulations for the international recognition of new breeds.

Recognition of new breeds

The task of the FCI Scientific Commission, in the process of the recognition of new breeds, is to investigate whether there are any severe anatomic or genetic impairments and to take care that the breeding basis of the new breeds is wide and diverse enough (8 family groups, previously denoted blood lines) to enable a healthy breeding. Furthermore, to look whether the potential new breed is indeed a new breed or if it is rather a variety of an already-recognised breed.

The new breeds which the commission investigated during this period were the Moscow Watch Dog and Lancashire Heeler.

A. Moscow Watch Dog

The microsatellites from 10 different dogs which were carried out are a little bit short, 10 additional would be needed. The microsatellites technique will be sufficient.

B. Lancashire Heeler

NKK (Norway) made the application as it is a British breed and the Kennel Club cannot apply.

The NKK only provided one family group. This means that they should provide additional data about 6 females and 2 males in each of the 8 family groups. Otherwise, the application could be approved.

Molecular genetic tests

According to the new regulations of the FCI regarding the recognition of a new breed, Molecular genetic tests should be carried out in order to assure that the new breed is based on genuine gene pool rather than a mixture of various existing breeds.

Upon consultation of the FCI General Committee (GC), it has been decided to execute all tests in one laboratory, which will provide its services to the FCI.

Upon request of the GC, the FCI Scientific Commission approached 3 world-leading laboratories in the field of canine molecular genetic tests in order to select the most adequate one for the task.

A short list was made and the results were sent to the GC for approval. Once approved, it will be announced to all FCI members and relevant commissions.

Health and Behaviour questionnaires

The FCI Scientific Commission prepared questionnaires about Health and Behaviour (with the FCI Breeding and Standards commissions), to be filled in as part of the application for the recognition of a new breed.

These questionnaires will be submitted for approval to the next FCI General Assembly.

Meeting of the Presidents of the FCI Standards and Scientific commissions with the FCI General Committee on April 4th, 2014 in Amsterdam

The presidents of the FCI Scientific Commission presented the commission's proposals to be approved by the GC:

Dog Dentition

The GC accepted that missing PM1 and M3 should not be a reason for disqualification in any breed, as it is an evolutionary trait and not a genetic failure. It had already approved it in a previous meeting (Madrid). At the Amsterdam meeting, it was decided to send a letter signed by the FCI President and the presidents of the FCI Standards and Scientific commissions to the relevant breed clubs, asking them to amend the standards accordingly.

Expert panels for Eye, Heart and Orthopedic genetic diseases

The establishment of these panels was approved by the GC, which restricted the number of members of each panel to 5. It had already approved it in a previous meeting (Madrid).

On second thought, it was agreed by the majority of the Scientific Commission members that it may not be a good idea to expand these panels so much.

Less people usually work together better.

Nevertheless, a panel requires at least two people for each topic.

Therefore, the Scientific Commission proposed the panel of experts which will represent the following topics: hips, elbows, eyes and heart.

In the future, this panel should be expanded to molecular genetics as well.

This was approved by the GC.

I would like to express my gratitude to all the members of the FCI Scientific Commission, who contributed so much to the tasks of the commission always willingly, effectively in a friendly atmosphere.

I would also like to emphasise the tight collaboration with the FCI Standards Commission and the President of the FCI Breeding Commission.

The Commission welcomed a new member voted on at the General Assembly in 2013 when Mr Claude Guintard from France filled the place of Mrs Mulholland from Ireland. Former president, Mr Raymond Triquet is still the Commission's much appreciated senior adviser, a position he has held since 2007 when he resigned from the full membership.

The Standards Commission main work to revise and adapt new and existing standards is constant. The focus on dog's health continues to cause countries to review the text in standards extra carefully to avoid wordings that may result in interpretations that can lead to exaggerations that might cause health risks in the dogs. The reviewing of text in standards also involves adaption to new scientific and evolutionary research. Like the scientific proof that the lack of any or all of the PM1 and M3 teeth is an evolutionary trait and not a genetic one. That is the reason for the recommendation in the Model standard to cease to regard lack of PM1 and M3 as a disqualifying fault.

During the last couple of years there has also been an increase in the wish to know what coat colour patterns are really typical and the urge to know the genetic formula of different coat colours has also increased. The effect of this is that the Commission's work continues in close collaboration with the Scientific Commission.

The Commission still only has one annual meeting and hence the procedure for a standard to be revised may take a year, or more.

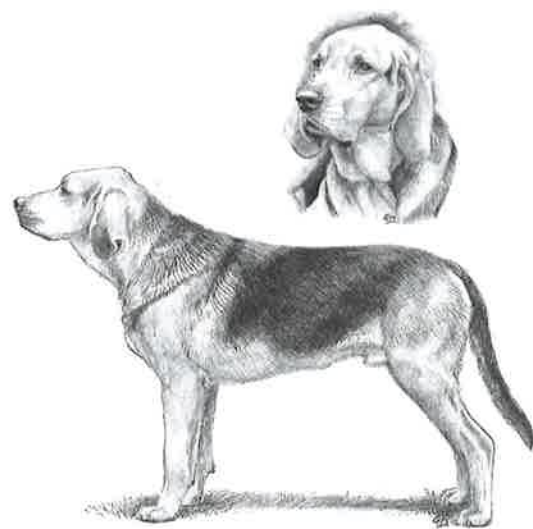
The Commission amends or thoroughly revises standards continuously and the co-operation with the member countries is usually efficient. Still, the procedure has to go through several steps before a standard can be published, and rightly so as these documents are the backbone in the work of the FCI and its member countries.

Viewing of the text in standards from a health and welfare perspective is intensified. This is not always to the liking of the countries of origin but, in the interest of keeping the breeds for the future, we all have to realise that exaggerations in type as well as character issues in guard dogs might not only jeopardise the health of the dogs, it may also increase the risk to have breeds banned by law.

The model standard

It is the Standards Commission's wish that the model standard will be regarded with the seriousness it is intended. It is updated to be a guide and advice to any amendments or revisions made to standards, regardless if it concerns breeds that are fully recognised or provisionally. The caption under the illustration on the first page, "This illustration does not necessarily show the ideal example of the breed" that has been obligatory in all standards since 2010 will be deleted in all new and newly adopted standards after October 2013. It is the General Committee's wish that illustrations aim to show a perfect example of the breed. The Standards Commission will carefully examine all illustrations.

Many countries provide excellent drawings, like, for example, what Poland has recently done to illustrate the fully-revised standard of their large hunting dog, Ogar Polski. The breed is now also correctly moved to section one for large breeds in Group 6.

The 2014 Commission meeting took place in Amsterdam

The meeting took place in the beautiful premises of the Raad van Beheer, the Dutch canine organisation in early April. The Commission welcomed the new member, Mr Claude Guintard from France. Mr Guintard, together with former president Mr Triquet had during the year thoroughly amended the standards for Poodle, Azawakh and French Bulldog.

Among several fully revised standards were many of the Croatian breeds, some of Finland's and one of the Polish Hounds, the larger one – Ogar Polski, which has also been correctly moved from the section of medium-sized hound to the section of large hounds.

■ FCI AGILITY COMMISSION – Activity report

In 2014, we had two meetings with delegates of those national canine organisations who are members of the FCI Agility Commission. Both meetings were held in Luxembourg.

One meeting at the end of January 2014, followed by the 1st official FCI workshop for international judges.

More than 20 countries were presented by international judges.

We, FCI Agility commission members, do have the following goals with regard to this workshop:

- Same understanding/interpretation of the Trial-rules and Judges' guidelines worldwide
- Getting a view to the coordination an Agility judge needs and how to train it
- Spreading these ideas in the country one is from and educating the other judges from your country

This workshop aimed at standardising the judging worldwide and I think we were very successful.

The meeting we had in January was the first one after the FCI General Assembly, so we had the elections of the board-members.

The President, Christa Bremer, the Vice-presidents, WilfClaes, Paolo Meroni, Marco Mouwen and Bernd Hüppe, were re-elected by their national canine organisations and also by the delegates. So, we do not have any changes and even the duties of these board-members are still the same as before.

Besides the elections, we had a lot of other points on our agenda for this meeting, like discussions about obstacle guidelines, report about the huge international events we had in 2013 JEO; EO and WC.

Changes of the rules for JEO and EO. Discussions and resolutions to application sent in by the national canine organisations.

This meeting was a two-day real working-meeting, with a lot of debates, resolutions about interpretations of rules and necessary amendments for the JEO and EO, the necessity of guidelines for Agility obstacles and final information about the events in 2014 JEO (host: Italy), EO (host: Hungary) and WC (host: Luxembourg).

■ FCI BREEDING COMMISSION - Activity report



The annual meeting of the Breeding Commission was arranged in Riga, on May 31st, with the most excellent hospitality of the Latvian Kennel Club.

Breed Specific Instructions (BSI) regarding exaggeration in pedigree dogs

Several important issues were discussed at the meeting. Among them was the Nordic project Breed specific instruction (BSI) regarding exaggerations in pedigree dogs, presented by Dr Astrid Indrebø. BSI was initiated by the Swedish Kennel Club (SKK) in 2009, and the Nordic BSI project started in 2012. The Nordic Kennel Union (NKU) is responsible for this project. There has been extensive collaboration between dog show judges, breed clubs, veterinary surgeons and health insurance statistics in the Nordic countries. The NKU BSI document was finished in April 2014.

The BSI document is in accordance with the FCI Basic statement for show judges: *Dogs fit for their original function*. Health and animal welfare for all pedigree dogs, based on the breed standards, are the basic elements in BSI. The intention is to raise the awareness of the judge regarding exaggerations and soundness. This will have great impact on the selection of dogs for breeding. There has been a lot of negative focus on dog shows and pedigree dogs the last years. The use of the BSI programme will promote healthy dog breeding, based on healthy breed standards. The FCI Standards Commission, together with the countries of origin of the specific breeds, has done excellent work during the last decades to improve the breed standards. If judges and breeders follow the FCI standards, without exaggerating the breed specific features, there should be a healthy future for pedigree dogs. Among the most serious problems seen in many popular pedigree dogs today, caused by exaggeration, is the respiration problems and eyelid problems. These are specially described in the Appendix of BSI.

The Breeding Commission (BC) made the following decision: *The Breeding Commission fully supports the NKU Breed Specific Instructions (BSI) regarding exaggeration in pedigree dogs; BSI is fundamental in the work of preventing unhealthy breeding. The BC encourages all kennel clubs to work in accordance to the BSI guidelines. The BC encourages FCI to publish the NKU-BSI on their website and to work for similar instructions within all FCI countries.*

The FCI Standard Commission, together with the countries of origin for the specific breeds, has done excellent work during the last decades to improve the breed standards. One example is the description of the fontanel in breed standard of Chihuahua. It takes generations to change a breed, and the changes in this breed standard has been step by step to give the breeders time to select against a very unhealthy feature: the fontanel.

1985: *The mollera (a fontanel) is typical for the breed, but not absolutely necessary.*

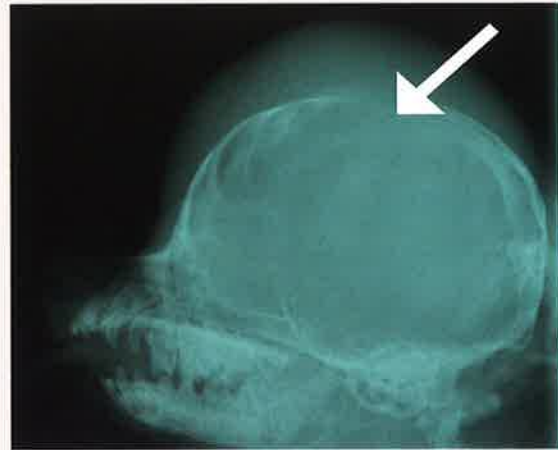
1996: *Well-rounded "apple domed" head, without or only with a small fontanel.*

2004: *Preferably without fontanel, but a small fontanel is accepted. Large fontanel is disqualifying.*

2009: *Well-rounded apple head. Disqualifying faults: Dogs with an open fontanel.*

A three-month old Chihuahua puppy was brought in coma to the Small Animal Clinic of the Norwegian School of Veterinary Science. It had been playing on the floor when it bumped into a chair. Examination showed severe head trauma, due to a large fontanel. The puppy was euthanased.

Why are puppies like this still born? Changes in the breed standard only have impact on pedigree dogs, and most impact on show dogs. When a breed gets popular, there often is a major rise in unregistered puppies and commercial breeding. Healthy breed standards has little impact on unregistered dogs...



DogWellNet – a unique platform for sharing information concerning dogs, breeding and animal welfare

The president and secretary gave a short presentation of the background and current development of DogWellNet.com and the International Partnership for Dogs (IPFD), which represents an exciting new development to support cooperation, collaboration and sharing of information and resources across the global dog community. This groundbreaking collaboration between canine organisations, veterinary organisations and other stakeholders in dog health will serve to highlight the good work that is ongoing to enhance dog health, well-being and welfare and human-dog interactions. It will help us to identify the gaps in our knowledge and to identify the important next steps in this important work.

The BC made the following decision: *The FCI Breeding commission supports the work of the International Partnership of Dogs and the DogWellNet.com to enhance dog health, well-being and welfare and human-dog interactions across the global dog community, and request to FCI to be an active partner in the partnership, both ideologically and financially. The Breeding Commission also stresses that we should not only point out problems and issues concerning the pedigree dogs but all dogs, also dogs without a pedigree. The problems are the same in all dogs.*

Crossing of breed varieties

The new proposed text from the joint meeting of Scientific and Standards commissions in Amsterdam in April, where the president of BC was invited by FCI to be present, was discussed and approved by the BC.

In addition, the BC agreed to propose to the General Committee (GC) that the coat, colour and size should be added in the three-generation pedigree, including the export pedigrees. This was approved by the GC at their November meeting.

Registration of imported dogs that would have been registered with limited registration (not allowed for breeding) if they were born in the country to where it is imported

This issue has been discussed also at the 2013 meeting, and the following proposal was then sent to the GC: *Standing Orders, art 5.2 should be changed to (the proposed addition to text is bold and underlined): Any member or contract partner can refuse to (re)-register in its studbook, **or register with limited registration not to be used for breeding**, a dog suffering from hereditary defects or featuring defects which go against Art 2 in the Statues or a dog which does not comply with the rules of selection defined by the member or contract partner in question.*

At the GC meeting in April, the proposal was turned down.

The BC had a long discussion on the issue at our meeting in May 2014, and all the delegates agreed to send the proposal to GC once more, as they find the matter of major importance for the breeding of healthy pedigree dogs.

Summary of the discussion: It is clearly now contradictory to the regulations in some of the FCI countries vs. FCI regulations (Finland, Switzerland and France, and Norway will probably do the same). Belgium also pointed out that if FCI does not allow limited registration also on imported dogs like BC has proposed, the national political authorities might start to interfere, especially when it comes to health issues.

Background

Some national canine organisations register dogs with a limited registration (not to be used for breeding) due to e.g.:

- increased risk for diseases of the dog
- or increased risk for diseased offspring
- or disqualifying coat colour

- or to prevent matador breeding which will increase the risk for narrowing the gene pool, which in turn will increase the risk of inbreeding.

According to the FCI rules (**Standing Orders, art. 8.2**), a member or contract partner can refuse to (re)-register in its studbook a dog suffering from hereditary defects or featuring defects which go against Art 2 in the Statutes or a dog which does not comply with the rules of selection defined by the member or contract partner in question.

The FCI International Breeding rule, Art.1, point 1-3:

1. The International Breeding Regulations of the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) are binding on all member countries and contract partners.

- These FCI breeding regulations apply directly to all FCI member-countries, as well as the contract partners. This means that breeding may only be carried out with pedigree dogs which have a sound temperament, are healthy in functional and hereditary terms and are registered with a studbook or register (appendix) recognised by the FCI. In addition, they have to fulfil the requirements specified by the relevant FCI member or contract partners.
- The only dogs which are considered to be healthy in hereditary terms are those transferring breed standard features, breed type and temperament typical of that breed without displaying any substantial hereditary defects which could impair the functional health of its descendants. The members and contract partners of the FCI are required in this regard to prevent any exaggeration of breed features in the standards, which could result in impairment of the dogs' functional health.
- Dogs with eliminating faults such as e.g. unsound temperament, congenital deafness or blindness, hare-lip, cleft palate, substantial dental defects or jaw anomalies, PRA, epilepsy, cryptorchidism, monorchidism, albinism, improper coat colours or diagnosed severe hip dysplasia may not be bred.

Questions that were discussed:

- How do we register imported dogs that are registered without limitations in the country from where they are imported, but would have limited registration if they were born in our country?

The unanimous opinion of all the delegates FCI Breeding Commission is that the rules for registration and limited registration should be the same for all dogs registered in the national canine organisation, independent where the dog is born.

- Are the canine organisations allowed to register an imported dog with limited registration, according to Standing Orders 8.2, even though it has a normal registration (without limitation) from the export country?

The unanimous opinion of all the delegates FCI Breeding Commission is that this must be allowed!

- Or are the canine organisations only allowed to refuse registration of the imported dog?

It is the opinion of the Breeding Commission that it is much better to register these dogs with limited registration than to refuse to register them.

- Does the Standing Orders allow the national canine organisations to register these dogs with limited registration (not to be used for breeding) due to our national rules?

As the Breeding Commission understand Standing Orders, Art 5.2, the canine organisations are not allowed to do this.

Then it is clearly now contradictory to regulations in some of the FCI countries vs. FCI regulations (Finland, Switzerland and France, and Norway will probably do the same). If FCI do not allow limited registration also on imported dogs like BC has proposed, the national political authorities might start to interfere, especially when it comes to health issues.

Some examples:

- If one (or both) parents have severe hip dysplasia or elbow dysplasia, offspring in some countries are registered with limited registration.

If a dog from parents with severe HD/ED is imported, can it then be registered with limited registration?

- Some national canine organisations issue pedigrees with limited registration on offspring if the stud dogs has more than a certain number of offspring/litters (and some kennel clubs refuse to register these puppies). If the stud dog has puppies in another country after exceeding the number of puppies/litters and these puppies are imported to a country where his puppies would have been registered with limited registration, are the recipient country allowed to register the dog with limited registration?
- Some national canine organisations register e.g. two-coloured poodles, white boxers etc., with a limited registration. In accordance to FCI International Breeding Rules, Art 18, *all litters are to be fully registered at the same time; this includes all puppies reared to the date of application for registration*. This implies that it is not allowed to refuse registration of puppies with disqualifying coat colour born in a litter with accepted colours.

Can an imported e.g. two-coloured poodle with a full registration from the export country be registered with a limited registration in the country to which it is imported?

The GC discussed the matter again in their November meeting, and the board approved the proposal. The point will be on the agenda of the next General Assembly in 2015.

The use of FCI-approved kennel names

This issue has been discussed several times in the commission. The proposal has also previously been sent to GC: The following should be added in Art 9.4 of the Standing Orders (underlined):

FCI approved kennel names should only be used on litters registered in the stud book of the national canine organisations.

Based on this proposal from BC, the General Committee sent the following proposal forward to the General Assembly in 2013, to be added to the FCI Standing Orders (art 9.4,c):
A national canine organisation can add the FCI registered kennel name on the pedigrees if the breed in question is

recognised by the national canine organisation issuing the pedigree and/or by the FCI.

The proposal was approved by the General Assembly. It is, however, the opinion of the BC that the present Art 9.4.c does not cover our proposal. The point of the proposal is that a breeder with an FCI-recognised kennel name **is not allowed to use this FCI-recognised kennel name** on unregistered puppies (meaning puppies that are not registered in the stud book of the national canine organisation), when selling the puppies or announcing them for sale, or register them with unofficial pedigrees in unofficial registries.

The BC decided once more to send the proposal to GC. The Board discussed the matter again in their November meeting: "The Board keeps understanding that the decision made by the General Assembly in 2013 is correct and covers the point raised by the Breeding Commission. It "protects" the breeds recognised at national level only as they are allowed to have the FCI logo on their pedigrees. In addition, unregistered puppies do not get pedigrees. »

Owners name on the pedigree – or separate owner's certificate

Article 8 in FCI Standing Orders gives instructions concerning owners name on pedigrees:

- Art 8.8 states that *"each dog of a litter has to be provided with only one export pedigree, which must include the name of the owner of the dog."*
- Art 8.9 states that *"For each dog registered with an FCI member or contract partner and then exported, the national canine organisation that last registered the dog shall certify the transfer of the ownership to the new owner by stating his name and address on the export pedigree."*

Several countries do not include the name of the owner on the pedigree, but issue a separate owner certificate for the dog.

The BC decided to propose to GC that the FCI Standing Orders, Art 8.8 and 8.9 should be changed: if the export pedigree does not include the information about the owner, there must be a separate owner's certificate:

*Art 8.8 (the proposed changes are bold and underlined): each dog of a litter has to be provided with only one export pedigree, which must **should** include the name of the owner of the dog; **if the name of the owner is not written on the pedigree, there must be a separate owner's certificate issued by the national canine organisation.***

*Art 8.9 (the proposed changes are bold and underlined): For each dog registered with an FCI member or contract partner and then exported, the national canine organisation that last registered the dog shall certify the transfer of the ownership to the new owner by stating his name and address on the export pedigree **or by a separate owners' certificate."***

The issue was discussed at the board meeting of GC in November; the board agreed on the proposal, which will be on the agenda of the next General Assembly in 2015.

Studbook Initials on pedigrees

Art 8.3 in Standing Orders says that "the registration numbers and the initials should be provided for at least three generations." Austria presented three examples of pedigrees with missing studbook initials. This makes it very difficult to figure out where the dogs come from.

The Breeding Commission decided to ask the FCI Secretariat to send a circular to remind the national canine organisations that is of uttermost importance to add the initials to the registration numbers and not only the numbers, as stated in Standing Orders, Art 8.3.

The FCI Secretariat has reported back to the commission that a circular will be issued.

Date and place for the next meeting

The German canine organisation (VDH) has kindly invited the commission to have our next meeting in Dortmund February 13th 2015, in connection with the 2th International Dog Health Work Shop. The delegates are all encouraged to attend the workshop.

FCI FLYBALL COMMISSION - Activity report

Flyball is a unique dog sport that mainly distinguishes from other disciplines because it is a team sport. In one ring 8 handlers with their dogs off leash work simultaneously. It is always quite a marvellous spectacle to see a flyball team work together as a whole. The discipline originates from North America where it evolved since the early 70's. In the late 80's flyball flew over the United Kingdom, shortly followed to the European continent. Actually we also find flyball competitions in Australia, South Africa and Japan.

In 2013 FCI realised the prosperity of flyball and decided to start a new commission. Nine countries delegated a representative to the first meeting which was held in Brussels on March 16th, 2014. The commission started with a round-up of the actual situation of flyball in the different countries. Four present countries (Belgium, Germany, Czech Republic and France) have actually a competition under national rules, with 10 to 20 tournaments per year. The three first use electronic judging installation, France judges the tournaments by eye and with manual timing. In the other countries there are only few teams and no actual competitions. Main items in those countries are exhibition programmes on dog shows. There is also quite some flyball activity in some other countries, wherefrom no delegates were sent, like Poland, The Netherlands, Austria, Hungary and Australia.



The survey showed clearly smaller and bigger differences in the national rulings. All countries originally started with the rules of the North American Flyball Association, but made over the years their own adaptations. Therefore the main objective of the first year became to establish an international set of rules that could be workable for all countries. This turned out to be not that obvious due to lots of national differences. One of the biggest discussion points was the measuring of the dog's height. In flyball the jump height of each team is determined by the jump height of the smallest dog, which is quite important in the sport. Where most countries use the height at the withers, some other countries use the length of the forearm of the dog to determine the jump height of the smallest dog.

The next meeting of the FCI commission will be held in Hemer (Germany) on March 29th, 2015. First focus then will be to finalise the international rules in order to submit them to the general committee. Second item will be the organisation of an FCI World flyball tournament.

29 countries were present.

Not because of the complaint, but because we all love dogs. This is why we all are working in our national canine organisations for the welfare of our beloved best friends.

Dog shows are the window for all cynological interest, we have to endeavour to breed and show dogs which are healthy and fit for function. We have also got to make sure that the dog shows are made more attractive for visitors and exhibitors. The change of our rules and regulations has partially helped with this already. However, this aim also means that the organisation has to offer more interesting and informative side-programmes, which allow the visitors to find out more details about the pure bred breeds. This is the only way to make sure that we are able to continue with our hobby and also pass it on to the next generation. There is much to do, let's start and do it!

■ FCI COMMISSION FOR HERDING DOGS – Activity report



The FCI Commission for Herding Dogs' annual meeting was held in Rovaniemi, in northern Finland, on 26-28 September, 2014. Rovaniemi is not only Santa Claus's town, it is also the reindeer country where this characteristic animal is raised in an extensive system. The rhythm for the herder's life and work is set from the reindeer's annual cycle. After the rutting season, the reindeer gradually moves to the winter grazing grounds. The rutting season starts at the end of September – October. At this time of the year, part of the herds are driven in separate flocks. The animals are gathered together from the herders also with dogs. Usually, native dog breeds and unregistered dogs are used for this work, but Border Collies are also used. It is important to preserve the most important job of herding dog breeds. A herding dog breed that loses this aptitude loses the most important part of his ethogram and the typical breed behaviour.

The meeting was attended by Luigi Cavalchini, President (Italy), Lia Helmers (The Netherlands), Inna Baranova (Russia), Johann Kurzbauer (Austria), Katharina Björn (Sweden), Radko Loucka (Czech Republic), Sari Niemenen (Finland), Sandra von Erlach, Secretary (Switzerland). We had been invited by the Finnish canine organisation and everything was organised by Sari Niemenen. Everybody

arrived on Thursday and most of us were surprised to find out that winter had already arrived in Rovaniemi and there was snow and it was very cold. Nevertheless, we all met in the same hotel where we had booked in. We had a deli dinner together and some of the members (elected in Talheim as a working group) were going to meet in the morning to get all the details ready for the meeting, starting Friday after lunch, with all the committee members. The meeting was very constructive and the working group within the commission for Herding Dogs really did a good job and so they were able to give us an overview on their work.

During the meeting, most of the work was done completing and adapting the regulation proposal for The Natural Herding Aptitude Test (NHAT). This will be a new name for the TANC or Herding Instinct Test (HIT) which are officially recognised in some national rules.

Herding instinct is a complex of hereditary characteristics and abilities which makes a dog useful to control flock animals. It is a stereotyped, compulsive and still purposeful behaviour of sheepdogs, which is not the result of learning or experience.

The FCI Natural Herding Aptitude (NHAT) is meant to establish the main characteristics all different shepherd dog breeds have in common: interest in flock animals, willingness to cooperate with its handler, the drive to control the movement of the flock, the natural aim to search for the balance position opposite to its handler to gain better control of the flock.

By the limited conditions of this test, dogs can only show these basic features. It should be noted that only training and experience will allow the dog to face more difficult trials, in which the most gifted dogs will be able to express at the maximum level of their natural aptitude.

The FCI Natural Herding Aptitude (NHAT) is open for shepherd dog breeds belonging to FCI groups 1, 2 or 5, except for guarding dog breeds.

The test may be a useful instrument for breed clubs to preserve the specific behaviour of herding breeds. The test may be held on sheep and/or cattle.

The test is divided in two parts, the first one aims to verify the basic sociability of the dog and the second part tests its aptitude as a herding dog.

The complete rules are part of the meeting minutes.

The members analysed the herding dogs situation in different countries. It was very interesting to hear from Inna that in Russia they also work with Corgies. In Switzerland, there was a meeting between Sandra von Erlach and two representatives of the Swiss canine organisation (SKG), as there is a group of Swiss people founding a new club for working Sheepdog breeds (excluding Border Collies and Kelpies). If all goes well, this should be happening in 2015. Finland had some trials and instinct tests this year, there are two places in Finland - south and northeast - which have enough sheep, this due to regulations of animal welfare. There was a discussion that animal welfare is an important issue. The judge can decide at any time to stop handler and dog to continue their work. Johann

Kurzbauer (Austria) gave us a short report about the work they are doing in Austria. Radko (Czech Republic) showed us statistics of his country about the successful tests of herding collecting and traditional Style and trials. In 2013, 14 official herding events were organised in Czech Republic, mostly lasting 2 days, which successfully passed 333 dogs, 178 in collecting style and 155 in traditional style. Every year, 2 CACITR events are organised; next year, they would like to organise 4 of them. Luigi explained about their situation in Italy. Most of the trials run under FCI are traditional style. The biggest problem is the lack of FCI judges. Lia (The Netherlands) explained that in the past years a lot of things happened. The Dutch national canine organisation accepted the draft for the rules. They formed a working group out of delegates from breed clubs. From January 1st 2015, they are allowed to run trials under the FCI rules. Inna (Russia) explained that in Russia they have a test every month, 4 trials, 2 traditional and 2 collecting styles. There are only a few Border Collies competing, but quite a few Corgies. They have 3 judges, but only 2 trainers in Russia. Katarina (Sweden) explained there is a group under the Swedish canine organisation who wanted to run under the American rules, but she explained that there are FCI Rules where the EU Countries can run in various countries.

The level of competitors and experience with trials increases, so that some issues need to be clarified. Many handlers wish to move the qualification level from 70% to 80%, or instead of 3x so 5x, both in Traditional and Collecting Style.

Sari also organised a visit to a Reindeer farm. There, we were introduced to some Reindeer and the farm owners explained how the farm is worked and we learnt a lot about the Reindeer itself and dog herding in the North of Europe.

■ FCI OBEDIENCE COMMISSION - Activity report



Traditionally, the highlight of our obedience sport has been the World Winner competition in Obedience. This year the World Winner 2014 competition was hosted by the Finnish Kennelclub in Helsinki, Finland. The obedience competition was held in connection with the World Dog Show, but took place a few days before the dog show on August 5th till 8th. The competition site was the Helsinki Exhibition and Convention Centre.

The WW competition was well organised. There were competitors from altogether nineteen nations. Due to some unfortunate last minute cancellations there were altogether a few less than the maximum one hundred competitors that are allowed to enrol. The most distant nations were Ukraine and Japan. We also had visitors from India. They were interested in the FCI obedience activities and the new rules for classes 1 & 2 & 3.



The judges of the WW competition were the following: Carina Savander-Ranne from Finland was chief judge and chaired the organising committee. The actual judging of the exercises was done by Christian Steinlechner from Austria, Uwe Wehner from Germany, Piritta Pärssinen from Finland and Stein Feragen from Norway.

It must be noted that Central and Southern Europe has taken huge steps in obedience. Finland took its place on top again for the sixth time, but the silver place went to Germany and bronze place to Italy. Russia has had good results lately, now being fourth and Sweden and Norway had to settle for fifth and sixth place. The individual championship went to Sandra Rohrer and I'm Freezer vom Chiemgauer Ländchen from Germany. Their work was quite superior, happy and accurate.

The huge and time-consuming revision of the obedience rules and guidelines was finalised during the year. The classes 1 & 2 were combined with class 3 into one booklet. Some new exercises were composed with the aim of making obedience more interesting to watch and maybe also to be more activating for the dogs. Focus in the revision was also to better build up the dog towards the higher classes. It is our aim that as many countries as possible will take these new rules as part of their national obedience programme so that mobility of the competitors will increase. It is also a wish to once more get a broader scope of breeds competing on top.

The annual meeting of the obedience commission was held in Brussels, Belgium. There were altogether thirteen nations represented at the meeting. In addition to the discussion on the obedience rules, our future world championships were discussed. It seems practical that the competitions would be held at some other site than the World Dog Shows. Also rally obedience was discussed. The commission members saw that the commission's time and expertise is not sufficient to manage rally obedience as well as obedience and thus the commission recommends that a new commission be founded for rally obedience.

The presidency of the Obedience Commission is held by Dr Carina Savander-Ranne from Finland and the vice-presidency by Mr Johann Kurzbauer from Austria. Mr Ton Hofman from The Netherlands has been Secretary for the Commission.

■ FCI SHOW JUDGES COMMISSION - Activity report



As usual our Annual meeting was held in the first week of February. Our hosts were our French colleagues in Paris. We are grateful for their kind hospitality and for our memories of an educative, meaningful and agreeable weekend under the famous Eiffel Tower. Again, it was a weekend with a lot of work and discussion in two commissions that lead to several important proposals for the FCI General Committee. More and more, non-European countries enter the Show Judges Commission and that is a great achievement. Only together we can make our proposals work.

Unfortunately, the FCI General Committee only decided at the end of the year about our proposals, so a lot of time was left waiting for answers.

However, the proposals that were sent to the FCI General Committee were nearly all accepted. This is the crown on hard work and good preparation by all of us. Thank you all for your cooperation!

Mutual recognition of FCI and KC judges

The former President and former Vice-president of our commission discussed a concept statement in London twice in 2013. This led to a revised statement and some agreements that the two boards (FCI and KC) further discussed in 2014. It is a pity that we are still waiting for the answers that should come from The Kennel Club. In the meantime, The Kennel Club persisted in asking the FCI judges their CV before judging in England. We stay in contact with our board and act when possible.

European Judges List

The FCI approved to manage this website from January 1st, 2014. More and more countries participate in this international list and more and more organisers use it to develop their judges lists for shows. From December 2014, an English version of the Administrator and User Manuals was made available. This information was sent to all national canine organisations (NCOs).

Basic statement judging dogs for their function

The statement was approved in 2014. However, there is no need to "attach" it to the breed standards as also requested, as most of its contents is already included in the breed standards. It is however considered important to give to this statement the visibility it deserves. A revised statement in English was published on the FCI website. We think this approval shows that the FCI General Committee really understands the importance of breeding and judging healthy dogs with a good behaviour. The statement is getting more and more a document judges use when judging.

Breed-by-breed education

Our aim to have a uniform education for every individual breed, developed by the country of origin of the breed, for international use has come a step closer to reality. The FCI General Committee approved our proposal and sent

our Basic PowerPoint presentation to all NCOs, with the request to develop PowerPoints in English for their own breeds. We made arrangements for breeds whose origin is in non-FCI countries. Unfortunately, most countries have not answered our request to develop some breed education PowerPoint. Only The Netherlands developed one for nearly all their breeds. The PowerPoint educations are online for commission members at the website of the Dutch canine organisation. The FCI General Committee decided to take over these PowerPoints and develop a special link on the FCI website. We hope they can be online on the FCI website in 2015. We also hope that countries will finally start to develop these education PowerPoints, because they are very helpful in educating judges all over the world.

FCI judges tested by AKC

There is an AKC rule that says that foreign judges have to do a test before they can judge at AKC events. The FCI General Committee was asked to discuss this matter with the AKC and ask them to exempt judges from this ruling. The FCI General Committee approved our request and discussed this with the AKC board. Thanks to our investment, the AKC dropped this rule.

Control system for approval of all-round judges

The Show Judges Commission developed a concept form with which the FCI can control whether a NCO keeps to the rules when appointing a judge to become an FCI all-round judge. We asked the FCI General Committee to take over this form and send it to the FCI countries with the request to fill it in for all new FCI all-round judges and all FCI judges who became an FCI all-round judge from January 1st, 2013 (if possible). The FCI General Committee agreed in doing this by January 1st, 2015. The FCI General Secretariat will be responsible for controlling the nomination of all-round judges, the Show Judges Commission will assist when needed.

FCI decision regarding missing teeth

We asked the FCI 1st to send a circular regarding this matter to the NCOs and to make clear that judges are supposed to act and/or judge according to the standard of the breed. As long as the standard has not been changed regarding this statement of missing teeth, this cannot be taken into account when judging. The Standards and Scientific Commissions prepared a letter to the NCOs involved, recommending to amend their breed standard. In the meantime, the standard is the rule.

In 2014, our President joined the FCI Asia and the Pacific Section meeting to inform its members about the work of the FCI Show Judges Commission. During this meeting - and also in a lot of meetings during several shows with "smaller" countries - it came to mind that a basic education programme and breed-by-breed education is needed to educate judges in countries where there are few dog breeds and/or judges. Education to write critiques is also a request from several countries. We are working on that.

In 2014 the Executive Committee of the Show Judges Commission changed as follows:

- Adrian Landarte, Vice-President (Uruguay)
- Anne-Marie Class, Secretary (France)

Our President, Vice-president and Secretary meet once every year. Several topics were discussed by email in the past year and several times at shows. You will largely find these mentioned on the agendas of the Commission's meetings.

We thank Yves De Clercq and his colleagues from the FCI General Secretariat in Thuin for the way in which our documents were at all times sent promptly and correctly translated to our members and our thanks also go to the FCI General Committee member Tamàs Jakkel who supported and defended our proposals at all times.

Again, another year that passed very quickly. A year in which social pressures on our dogs and on ourselves as show judges intensified considerably in many countries. We must jointly make a strong case for promoting fine but, especially, healthy and socialised dogs as well as dogs that are fit for their function, to ensure that cynology does not fall in an irreversible downwards spiral. That will have to be a basic theme of our discussions and concerns in the coming years.

The annual meeting of the FCI Commission for Sighthounds Races took place in Lavarone on June 26th.

We planned 84 races and 52 lure-coursings.

The European Championship Lure Coursing was held in Malga Millegrobbe Lavarone (Italy) on 27-29 June. Over 780 participants were announced.

The World Championship Racing was held in Tampere (Finland) on 6-7 September, with 230 participants.

■ FCI COMMISSION FOR SLEDGE DOGS – Activity report

In 2014 the FCI Commission for Sledge Dogs continued its work and met in Bratislava, Slovakia, on 17 and 18 May. A perfectly well-organised meeting thanks to the organisers and the Slovakian national organisation (Slovenska Kynologicka Jednota).

During the period under review, the work of the commission focused mainly on the discussion, drafting and adoption of the document "Guidelines and Recommendations for international regulations for the tests making dogs eligible to enter the "working class" in dog shows and the delivery of CACT to enable dogs to become Working Champions", on a coherent basis.

These Guidelines, that are not regulations as they are related to national events, take into account the two kinds of tests existing currently, the working test and the racing test. The working test is highly appreciated by all participants, but only exists in Finland at the moment, while racing tests exist in many countries and needed to be harmonised. Most of the various problems faced by Member countries, such as Delivery of CACT, Titles of National Working Champion and few others were solved and the document was finalised and approved unanimously by all Members.





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Other Issues were also discussed such as:

- the complete ban of sled dogs competitions in South Africa;
- problem of null pedigrees for sled dogs in Russia;
- preparation of some revisions to the document approved in 2011 on FCI Sled Dogs Working Judges to be discussed next year;
- Preparation of the main lines of the document to be discussed in 2015 about regulations for the delivery of CACIT for sled dogs.

The next meeting of the commission is planned to be held on 23rd and 24th May 2015, but the location could not yet be decided.

Immediately after the meeting, all decisions and the adopted document were forwarded to the General Committee for examination and, whenever possible, adoption. The proposed document was then approved by the General Committee at its November 2014 meeting in Amsterdam, the General Committee underlying that those guidelines are not regulations as they are related to National Events.

I sent a letter to all the commission members to ask which country would be a candidate to organise the European Cup - Spaniels 2015, but no answer has been received yet.

■ FCI COMMISSION FOR UTILITY DOGS – Activity report



Twenty-five nations competed in the 2014 FCI World Championships - Tracking Dogs.

The FCI World Championships - Tracking Dogs Champion for 2014 was Mr Zdravco Klicek from Croatia with his German Shepherd Dog, scoring a total of 196 points. Germany was crowned the 2014 Team World Champion. The following grades were awarded: 4 x Excellent, 10 x Very good, 15 x Good, 2 x Satisfactory and 13 x Failed.

The 2015 FCI World Championships - Tracking Dogs will be held in Moscow, Russia.

Meetings

Two meetings were held in 2014 (08.03.2014 and 15.09.2014) in Malmö, Sweden which were attended by delegates from the FCI member countries. I would like to thank all those delegates who were present for their cooperation.

2014 FCI World Championships - Tracking Dogs

The 2014 FCI World Championships - Tracking Dogs took place in Oberdorla, Germany on 24 - 27 April 2014. I would like to express my gratitude to the organisers for their excellent work. The dogs, which were assessed by judges Bernard Roser from France and Theodor Krajcec from the Czech Republic, were able to demonstrate an extremely good level of performance in Oberdorla. The supervisor of this event was Mr Jos Mondot from Luxembourg.

2014 FCI European Open for Tracking Dogs

The FCI European Open for Tracking Dogs did not take place in 2014.

2014 FCI World Championships - Utility Dogs

The 2014 FCI World Championships - Utility Dogs were held in Malmö, Sweden on 9-14 September 2014 with 123 competitors from 36 countries. Four starters with a "wild card" competed in the 2014 FCI World Championships - Utility Dogs, i.e. the Rottweiler, Dobermann, Dutch Shepherd Dog and Giant Schnauzer world champions. All of these world associations have a contractual agreement with the FCI.

The organisation carried out by Ms Katinka Ryttse and her colleagues once again deserved all our gratitude for the effort put into the two-year preparation phase and for the extremely correct and conscientious way in which



the event was run. The competitors and spectators were very happy with how these World Championships were organised.

The judges for this World Championship event were Mr Urs Meyer from Switzerland for the tracking section, Mr Gerold Schreyrer from Austria for the obedience section and Mr Hari Arcon from Slovenia for the guard dog section. The supervisor for section A was Mr Eberhard Uekötter from Germany, while sections B and C were supervised by Mr Wilfried Schäpermeier from Germany.

The title of FCI Utility Dogs World Champion for 2014 was awarded to Mr Fabian Robinson from the USA with his Malinois "Graubaer's Boker", with a total score of 282 points. Germany was crowned the 2014 Team World Champion with a total score of 833 points.

Results: 0 x Excellent, 31 x Very Good, 58 x Good, 5 x Satisfactory, 29 x Unsatisfactory.

Two animal welfare representatives were present in the arena or on the site each day of the FCI IPO World Championships. Remark: a number of dogs were kept in poorly ventilated vehicles.

The 2015 FCI World Championships - Utility Dogs will be held in Delémont, Switzerland.

FCI International Judges' Seminar

The FCI Commission for Utility Dogs launched its regional FCI IPO judges' seminars in 2014.

There are 4 regions:

1. Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Israel, Spain and the AWDF (American Working Dog Federation)
2. Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania
3. Austria, Switzerland, Poland, Hungary, Russia, Slovakia, Czech Republic, Japan and Taiwan
4. Slovenia, Italy, Croatia, Serbia, Greece, Romania, Bulgaria, Thailand and Malaysia



In 2014, the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs organised FCI international judges' seminars in Tallinn, Estonia and Hemer, Germany. These seminars are intended as further training sessions for judges with the aim of contributing towards more consistent assessments on the part of the judges. The intention is for these judges to serve as multipliers of this seminar in their own countries and help achieve greater consistency when judging the dogs and handlers.

These two seminars were received very well with 24 IPO judges from 7 FCI countries attending in Tallinn, Estonia. In Hemer, Germany, there were 34 IPO judges from 7 FCI countries present at the seminar, including judges from the AWDF.

The FCI Commission for Utility Dogs would like to thank the speakers at these seminars, Wilfried Schäpermeier from Germany and Frans Jansen from The Netherlands, for the effort they put into their talks.





The topic was: the FCI IPO Regulations and correct implementation of the rules.

At the meeting of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs held on 8 March 2014, a resolution was adopted to impose a ban on the sale of electrical stimulation devices and spiked collars at the FCI IPO World Championships from 2015 on. This resolution will be included in the specifications for the running of the FCI World Championships.

The following resolutions were also adopted at the same meeting:

- The judges adjudicating at World Championship events will be selected 3 years in advance.
- From 2014, the annual judges' meeting will be held at regional training sessions and special conferences for judges adjudicating at World Championship events.



The following resolutions were adopted at the meeting of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs held on 8 March 2014:

- The 2018 FCI World Championships - Utility Dogs will be held in Italy. The 2015 FCI World Championships - Utility Dogs have already been awarded to Switzerland.
- At the FCI IPO World Championships from 2014 on, the judges shall wear grey trousers/dark jeans, a blue blazer, a white shirt and a tie with the FCI logo where possible.

Conclusion

To conclude, I would like to express my gratitude to all the delegates of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs for their support and active cooperation, I would also like to thank the FCI Executive for its consistently positive appraisal of our motions, which likewise expresses its appreciation of our work.

My sincere thanks also to the FCI General Secretariat for the wonderful cooperation over the last year.

Some comments on the Balance sheets 2014 (vs 2013)

Assets

Fixed Assets

The most notable difference between 2013 and 2014 is to be found in the item **"Building and Building Layout"**. Mostly the construction of the extension to the current FCI Building accounts for this difference. In 2013, the total amount was 761,000 € and it reached, in 2014, 1,646,000 €.

Current Assets

The item **"Goods stock for resale"** covers inventories related to the FCI Centenary (Cobby, FCI Centenary Book). As indicated in our 2013 report, the value of this inventory was brought down to 0 following the recommendation of our Auditor.

The item **"Trade Debtors"** consists mainly of outstanding amounts to be received from our member countries and these have reached a rather high level. However they will be corrected in the near future, as the 2015 General Assembly is getting closer.

The item **"Investments and cash at bank and in hand"** is greatly dependent on stock market developments (securities) even though the value of the whole portfolio

is secured. Our liquidity continues to be excellent. The decrease in 2014 (vs 2013), 489,000 €, is mostly due to the use of the funds to finance the building of the new extension.

Liabilities

The increase in the item **"Accumulated Profits"** corresponds to the annual profits for 2014.

The item **"Allocated fund for dismissal"** covers statutory reserves for staff; the defined objective is to have this fund grow - via annual payments - to reach the annual payroll amount. 2014 saw the sum of 100,000 € again being allocated to this fund.

The increase in **"Provisions"** reflects the amount allocated for the 2015 General Assembly, 25,000 €.

Trade Debts, Social Debts and Deferrals and Accruals Income increased by 118,000 €. This is mainly due to the increased amount of invoices to be received, of the VAT (new building) and of the deferred incomes.

The final increase in **Assets-Liabilities** between 2013 and 2014 is 320,000 €.

Some comments on the Profit and Loss Account 2014 (vs 2013)

Operating Income

Revenues from international shows (**CACIB fees**) represent the FCI's main source of income; this year they have again been higher than in the previous year, with an increase of 35,000 €, 10,000 this being due to the excellent entry at the World Dog Show 2014. The total increase of the operating income for 2014 amounts to 33,000 €.

Operating Charges

Our operating charges decreased by 17,000 €. There were significantly more expenditures on specific items such as **Internet design and maintenance** with the creation of the new FCI website and **Meetings with AKC, CKC and KC**, as well as the new FCI Project, **FCI Youth**. To compensate for this increased amounts, the FCI spent somewhat less on, among other items, **Leasing** thanks to a profitable revision of the existing contracts, **Stamps** due to a fruitful cooperation with the Post Office and the establishment of a specific contract, **Magazine** of which the "paper" version has been discontinued. Presently, the online version "Newsletter" remains our main source of information, together with our Internet website and Facebook Page. Worth mentioning is the fact that there was no **General Assembly** in 2014 and

that the FCI reduced substantially, without discontinuing it, the contribution to the **International Partnership for Dogs** (from 76,000 € to 11,000 €) thus maintaining its involvement in this important project. Our former investment was crucial for the launch of the IPDF. The increase in the item **Remuneration** was either necessary or legally required. Evidently, it includes not only wage adjustments, but also the associated expenditure on social security contributions.

Operating profit amounts to 135,000 € (vs 86,000 € in 2013).

Financial income includes the value adjustments in the securities portfolio, as well as earnings from securities and liquid assets. The item remained stable.

Allocated fund: cf. notes on the balance sheet item "Affected Fund for dismissal".

The **result posted for the year** amounts to 77,000 € (vs 29,000 in 2013).

**REPORT TO THE FCI GENERAL ASSEMBLY ON THE ANNUAL

Pursuant to the request of Mr DE CLERCQ, Executive Director of the FCI, we submit our report in our capacities as external auditors.

We audited the annual accounts for the fiscal year ending 31 December 2014, drawn up based on the fundamental accounting principles as applied in Belgium, for which there is a balance sheet total of € 4.497.034,74 and for which the profit and loss account shows a profit for the year of € 77.066,52.

Our responsibility is to give an opinion on these annual accounts based on our audit. We executed our audit in compliance with the legal provisions and in accordance with the auditing standards that are applied in Belgium, as decreed by the *Institut des Reviseurs d'Entreprises*.

These auditing standards require that our audit be planned and executed to obtain reasonable assurance that the annual accounts do not have any significant anomalies, whether they result from fraud or from error.

In accordance with the above-mentioned auditing standards, we took into account the Federation's administrative and accounting organization as well as its system of internal control. We obtained the explanations and information we needed for our audit from the Federation's managing body and its officers. We examined, on a test basis, the evidence supporting the amounts that appear in the annual accounts. We assessed the accounting policies used and the reasonable nature of the significant accounting estimates made by the association as well as the overall presentation of the annual accounts. We believe that the audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the annual accounts for the year ended 31 December 2014 present fairly the assets, the Federation's financial position and its results of its operations in conformity with the general accounting principles as applied in Belgium.



Letter of Understanding between FCI and AKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The American Kennel Club (AKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs ; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose ; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between AKC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation ;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the parties as follows :

1. AKC will recognize the pedigree for any FCI registry that meets AKC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
2. AKC will not automatically give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries and FCI will not automatically give exclusive recognition to AKC's registry in the United States.
3. AKC will not register any dog born in an FCI member country until that dog has been registered in the Stud Book of the FCI registry or the AKC-recognised registry in that country. No dog born in the USA, belonging to breeds recognised by the AKC, will be registered by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered in the FCI-recognised registry in the United States. It is up to the FCI to decide about the registration of dogs born in the USA belonging to breeds not recognised by the AKC.
4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (AKC judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
5. FCI and AKC will deal with the judging approval reciprocity in a separate document (see attachment).

6. AKC will not sponsor any event in the country of an FCI member without the express permission of FCI and the FCI member. FCI will not sponsor any event within the territory of the United States without the express permission of AKC. Puerto Rico is exempted from this provision as both AKC and FCI have been previously sponsoring activities on that island.
7. While not an FCI member, FCI has graciously agreed to permit AKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. If the AKC teams win the competition, they are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
8. AKC registered dogs are eligible for the title of FCI International Champion under specific conditions to be agreed upon by the AKC and FCI.
9. Except with the agreement of the AKC, the FCI will not register kennel names for breeders living in USA (with exception of Puerto Rico) and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the AKC will not register kennel names for breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the AKC has accepted.
10. FCI agrees to send to the AKC headquarters all revised breed standards and AKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of its Complete Dog Book, which includes all AKC standards, each time that such publication is revised.
11. The terms of this letter of understanding is agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.



Breed Judging

At FCI CACIB international shows, the AKC judges are eligible to judge and award the CACIB provided that the two following conditions are fulfilled:

1. the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the AKC (this does not include FSS and Miscellaneous classes).
2. the judges in question are allowed to judge, under AKC regulations, the breeds in question at AKC events and award them championship points. An AKC judge, residing in the United States, may not be approved as an FCI judge (breed, group, all breed) eligible to award CACIB.

At AKC events, the FCI judges are eligible to judge and award championship points provided that the following conditions are fulfilled:

1. the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the FCI and by the national kennel club, in their country of residence, which has jurisdiction over the judges in question
2. the judges are members of their national kennel club, in their country of residence, which is an FCI member or contract partner
3. the judges in question are allowed to judge, under FCI regulations, the breeds in question at FCI International CACIB shows and award them the CACIB

Group and BIS Judging

It is up to both, the AKC and the FCI members, to choose to invite or not a judge to judge a particular group (according to FCI or AKC breed nomenclature) at an AKC event or at an international FCI CACIB show taking into consideration the experience of the judge, his judging credentials and the breeds and their numbers in the groups to judge.

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and the Kennel Club (KC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting, in the case of the FCI, pedigree dogs and in the case of the Kennel Club, all dogs; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between KC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed basis for the relationship between the parties as follows:

1. The KC, where it recognises the breed in question, will recognise the pedigree of any FCI registry that meets KC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
2. In so far as it is lawful, the KC will give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries provided that these registries meet KC requirements and the FCI will give exclusive recognition to the KC's registry in the United Kingdom. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.
3. The KC will not register any dog, or issue a pedigree to any dog, born in an FCI member country whose registry the KC recognises, until that dog has been registered in the FCI registry in that country. No dog born in the UK will be registered, or have a pedigree issued, by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered by the KC in the United Kingdom.
4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (KC or FCI judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
5. The FCI and the KC will endeavour to agree on the conditions to make their respective judges eligible to officiate at events sanctioned by them (FCI and KC).
6. The KC will not sponsor or support any event for dogs in the country of a current FCI member without the express permission of the FCI member. The FCI will not sponsor or support any event for dogs within the territory of the United Kingdom without the express permission of the KC. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.

7. While the KC is not an FCI member, the FCI has graciously agreed to permit the KC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. The KC teams may win the competition but are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
8. The FCI agrees to send to the KC headquarters all revised breed standards and the KC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of all revised breed standards. The FCI and KC will discuss health issues connected with breed standards on a regular basis.
9. FCI members are allowed to refer to the title of UK Champion by using the abbreviation "UK Ch + name of the dog".
10. Except with the agreement of the KC, the FCI will not register kennel names of breeders living in the UK and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the KC will not register kennel names of breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the KC has accepted.
11. The terms of this letter of understanding are agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

Memorandum of Understanding between FCI and CKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs;

WHEREAS the CKC and the FCI have, in the past, cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out these goals and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose;

WHEREAS it is recognized that both the FCI and the CKC are required to operate within the limits of the legislation governing their activities, including their respective constitution and by-laws;

NOW this letter of understanding expresses a mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the CKC and the FCI as follows:

1. The CKC acknowledges the role of the FCI and its governing institutions as set out in the FCI Statutes as the primary world federation of dog registries.
2. The FCI acknowledges the CKC as the primary kennel club in Canada.
3. The CKC and the FCI agree that when any information comes to the knowledge of one party, which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (judges suspension, amended standards etc.), it will immediately communicate, in writing, such information to the other party.
4. The parties will meet at the request of either of them, within a reasonable timeframe and on basis of a consistent mutually agreed agenda which will include matters of common interest.

5. The FCI agrees to send to the CKC head office a copy of all breed standards with revisions as they occur and CKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters all CKC breed standards with revision as they occur. The FCI and CKC will also share information concerning the decisions of their respective governing bodies such as the exchange of official publications.
6. The CKC will periodically provide the FCI with a list of the registries from the FCI member countries with which the CKC has reached an agreement providing for the mutual recognition of studbooks and pedigrees. The CKC will get in touch with all the FCI members and contract partners and inform them about the procedure to follow to gain CKC recognition. The FCI will notify the CKC of the accession of any country to FCI membership.
7. The details of a mutual recognition of FCI and CKC judges are written on a document which is part of this contract.
8. The FCI will not sponsor or sanction any event within Canada without the express permission of the CKC.
9. The CKC will not sponsor or sanction any event in an FCI member country without the express permission of the FCI and the agreement of the member country.
10. While not an FCI member, FCI graciously agrees to permit CKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, and Obedience Championship Events and any forthcoming canine performance event that may be mutually recognized by both organizations.
11. As long as no agreement is reached with regard to the working breeds (according to the FCI nomenclature) between the FCI and CKC, these breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are not eligible for the title of "International Beauty Champion". The non-working breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are eligible for this title provided that they comply with the FCI International Championship Regulations, i.e. 4 CACIB in 3 countries under 3 different FCI judges.
12. The CKC registered dogs are eligible for the other FCI international titles provided that they meet with the FCI requirements.
13. The FCI international directory of kennel names (affixes) is not open to CKC breeders and the FCI cannot guarantee that a CKC kennel name (affix) will not be similar to an FCI registered kennel name (affix) and conversely.

14. Both parties agree that the present Letter of Understanding shall not be interpreted or applied so as to require either party to act in a manner not authorized by or contrary to applicable legislation, including each party's constitution, rules or by-laws.
15. The terms of this Letter of Understanding are agreed to by both parties. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon giving the other party 60 days notice in writing.

CKC Judges eligibility to officiate at FCI International Events

From April 1st, 2009, the following dispositions will apply:

- a) CKC judges are allowed to judge in the FCI member countries all-breed, group and specialty national shows, the breeds they are approved to judge in Canada.
- b) CKC judges who have already judged international FCI CACIB shows before December 31st, 2007, are allowed to award CACIB at international FCI CACIB shows, FCI World and Sections shows, to the breeds they are approved to judge in Canada.
- c) Once a CKC judge has judged four (4) national shows in four (4) different FCI member countries by the FCI breed standards, he/she is allowed to award CACIB to the breeds he/she is approved to judge in Canada.

It will be the responsibility of the FCI Office and of the judges concerned to keep track of assignments undertaken in an FCI member country. Taking into account the legal restrictions on the exercise of extra-territorial jurisdiction by the CKC, it will be the responsibility of the CKC to communicate them to their judges and the practical implementation and enforcement of the agreed above principles will be under the responsibility of the FCI Office, of the FCI members and the judges concerned.
