

In accordance with the celebration of the 100 Anniversary of the Federation Cynologique Internationale, the General Committee of the FCI reviewed its Mission and Vision Statements and Values to maintain our leadership worldwide.

#### Mission statement

The FEDERATION CYNOLOGIQUE INTERNATIONALE (FCI) is the supreme authority of the canine culture worldwide. The FCI is responsible for safeguarding canine health and international dog activities to enhance the relations between dogs and humans. Established in 1911 the FCI includes 91 members and contract partners (one member per country). Each member issues their own pedigrees and train highly qualified judges. The FCI makes sure that the pedigrees and judges are mutually recognised by all the FCI members, contract partners and any person involved in their domestic canine scene.

The FCI supports, via its members and contract partners, the well-being of all dogs Worldwide.

#### Values

- THE FCI cares about all dogs worldwide.
- THE FCI considers the health, temperament and behaviour as the most important matters in dogs and their Breed Standards.

### **Executive Director's report**



Dear Readers,

2015 is behind us! It was, again, a very intensive year for the FCI, its Staff, its General and Executive Committees and all the working commissions (mandatory and non-mandatory).

It was a year with a General Assembly (Milan), with 4 General Committee meetings and 4 Executive Committee meetings. It was a year where our President, R. de Santiago (PR) was re-elected for 2 years at the head of the General Committee, together with his colleagues K. Järvinen (FI) and M. A.Martínez (AR). The General Committee was also happy to welcome a new President of the FCI Section for the Americas and the Caribbean, Dr J.L. Payró.

Unfortunately, Mr Stefik did not run for re-election. I would like to thank him, on behalf of the General Committee, for his long and precious contribution over the last 16 years.





New members have joined also Standards Commission: J. Nallem (UY) who was elected President. P. Muntean (RO), R. Oliveira (PT) and F. Asnaghi (IT). I would like to extend my thanks to R. Sporre-Willes who was a member of the commission for 16 years and its President for the last 8 years.



Pr Z. Trainin left FCI Scientific Commission, of which he was a member since 1985 and which he chaired for 6 years. The rest of the team has remained unchanged.

An important achievement in 2015 was the signing of the agreement of mutual reciprocity for FCI and KC judges. Of course, as usual, many "sport" and "show" regulations were amended and the FCI members were regularly informed about the changes.

In addition, the FCI was very happy to welcome a new contract partner: the Iran Kennel Club. We wish our Iranian friends lots of success with their Club. Let us underline that Nicaragua, Azerbaijan and the Republic of Macedonia were accepted as full members of the FCI while Turkey was promoted from the status of contract partner to associate member.

Three breeds were granted definitive international recognition and are now eligible for the CACIB and the title of CIB (International Beauty Champion): Ciobanesc Romanesc Carpatin, Ciobanesc Romanesc Mioritic and Taiwan Dog.

In November, further to the request of some members, the FCI General Committee decided to create a highly important « Working Group for Restructuring the FCI ». The task of this group is not less than modernising the Federation through amendments in it Statutes and Standing Orders. Different meetings will take place next year so that a final proposal can be put forward to the FCI 2017 General Assembly.

I do not believe in a good and efficient organisation without a reliable and strong administration. I have been lucky enough to cooperate with a very faithful team, which hardly changes over the years. We daily try to do our best to serve our members. (see page 10 of this Annual report).

I would like to thank all of you, FCI members, FCI General Committee and FCI Staff, for the excellent cooperation, taking us to a more modern, open and efficient FCI.

The Commission welcomed the new members voted on at the General Assembly in Milan 2015:

We said good bye to Mrs Renée Sporre-Willes who had decided not to present for re-election at the General Assembly and to Mr José Luis Payró who was voted as President of the Americas and the Caribbean Section of the FCI.

Both of them had been in our Commission for many years, so we will miss them very much, as well as their experience and cooperation.

At the renewed FCI offices in Thuin we held our first meeting on November 5th, 2015, with the new members and I was elected as new President of the Commission, which is a big honour and responsibility; I hope to carry on the excellent job that Renée has done as President and will try to use everything I learned from her - and from Prof. Triquet before - and with the cooperation of my friends on the commission will try to do my best.

The FCI Standards Commission's main work to revise and adapt new and existing standards is constant. The focus on dog health continues to cause countries to review the text in standards extra carefully, to avoid wordings that may result in interpretations that can lead to exaggerations that might cause health risks in the dogs.

The Commission amends or thoroughly revises standards continuously and the co-operation with the member-countries is usually efficient. Still, the procedure has to go through several steps before a standard can be published, and rightly so as these documents are the backbone in the work of the FCI and its member countries.

Viewing of the text in standards from a health and welfare perspective is intensified. This is not always to the liking of the countries of origin, but in the interest of keeping the breeds for the future, we all have to realise that exaggerations in type as well as character issues in guard dogs might not only jeopardise the health of the dogs, it may also increase the risk to have breeds banned by law.

#### The model standard

It is the Standards Commission's wish that the model standard will be regarded with the seriousness it is intended. It is updated to be a guide and advice to any amendments or revisions made to standards, regardless whether it concerns breeds that are fully or provisionally recognised.

#### FCI AGILITY COMMISSION - ACTIVITY REPORT

The last year was very successful for the Agility World. We had two meetings: one in February, combined with an international judges' seminar.

20 of the 36 NCO attended the meeting and sent judges to the seminar, too.

25 NCO were represented at the October meeting.

We got all necessary information about the venue, where the World Champion and the JEO would take place. The main themes at the meetings were:

- changing the obstacle-guidelines
- voting for judges for the international events
- setting up some rule changes for JEO and EO.
- colleting applications from the different NCO for rule changes, which will be valid from 2017 onwards
- answering upcoming questions from new delegates

We could welcome China, Philippines, Colombia and Turkey as new members of the Agility Commission.

The delegate of Italy, Sandra Deidda, invited all delegates to the WAC, answered all questions about the WAC; so did the delegate of Czech Republic for the Junior European Open, which took place in a football stadium in Roznov pod Radhostem. For the WAC, we confirmed Sandra Deidda from Italy and nominated Sascha Grunder (CH); for the JEO we confirmed two judges from CZ and nominated 1 from Hungary and 1 from Austria.

Up to the end of 2014, the Agility world did not know whether or not we would have a host for the EO 2015. I promised at the prize-giving parade EO 2014 in Hungary that we would find an NCO. Last but not least, Germany applied to be the host and all delegates agreed, because they knew the location from the 2009 WAC, which is in Rieden. This EO was a special one: for the first time, we had an international judge from outside of Europe (Japan), another one from Finland and two from Germany.

#### FCI BREEDING COMMISSION - ACTIVITY REPORT

The annual meeting of the Breeding Commission was arranged in Dortmund, on February 13<sup>th</sup>, the day prior to the 2<sup>nd</sup> International Dog Health Workshop, with excellent hospitality of the canine organisation (VDH).

Here are the main issues and decisions from the meeting:

#### Wisdom Panel - DNA breed identification

It was a great pleasure to welcome Dr Gregoire Leroy, for the FCI Scientific Commission, who had kindly offered to give a lecture on the laboratory Wisdom Panel concerning DNA breed identification. The delegates from the FCI Scientific and Standards commissions, as well as from the FCI Breeding Commission, were present to enjoy this very interesting lecture. After the lecture and some brief discussion, the FCI Scientific and Standard Commissions left to attend their joint meeting.

### Guidelines regarding criteria for limited registration (not allowed for breeding)

Based on a suggestion from Slovakia, it was decided in 2014 that the commission should work out a document with *guidelines* regarding criteria for limited registration. The delegates agreed that such guidelines will be of great importance for the national kennel clubs. It is, however, important that these are guidelines – *not specific rules*.

The BC (Breeding Commission) decided that the guidelines should be sent to FCI for approval and publication on the FCI website. The delegates are encouraged to publish the guidelines on the website of their national canine organisation.

These are the guidelines approved by the Breeding Commission, on February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2015:

1. The definition of limited registration in this document is "not allowed for breeding". A dog registered with limited registration will be issued an FCI pedigree, but the remark "not allowed for breeding" will be printed on the pedigree. This remark must also be available in the database of the national canine organisation, and be included in the data with open access for the public, if such a database is available.

If a dog with limited registration is used for breeding, the offspring cannot be registered in the studbook of any FCI member country or contract partner, unless the limited registration has been rescinded by the national canine organisation who established the limited registration.

When the term "national canine organisations" is used in this document, it includes the breed clubs commissioned by the national canine organisation to register dogs and issue pedigrees.

### 2. Who can decide to register a dog with limited registration?

- The national canine organisation that issues the original pedigree
- Import of dogs: The national canine organisation to which the dog is exported
- The breeder of the dog can ask the national canine organisation to register a puppy with limited registration when applying for registering. The breeder CAN-NOT choose to add limited registration to a pedigree after the ownership of the dog has been transferred to a new owner
- The dog's owner can ask the national canine organisation to register his/her dog with limited registration

### 3. Who can rescind (remove) a limited registration of a dog?

FCI International Breeding Rules, Art 15: A limited registration can only be rescinded by the national canine organisation that has established it.

### 4. Criteria for issuing limited registration: 4.1 Background

The fundament of these guidelines are given in FCI International Breeding Rules:

Art. 1.1: These FCI breeding regulations apply directly to all FCI member countries as well as the contract partners. This means that breeding may only be carried out with pedigree dogs which have a sound temperament, are healthy in functional and hereditary terms and are registered with a studbook or register (appendix) recognised by the FCI. In addition, they have to fulfil the requirements specified by the relevant FCI member or contract partners.

Art. 1.2: The only dogs which are considered to be healthy in hereditary terms are those transferring breed standard features, breed type and temperament typical of that breed without displaying any substantial hereditary defects which could impair the functional health of its descendants. The members and contract partners of the FCI are required in this regard to prevent any exaggeration of breed features in the standards which could result in impairment of the dogs' functional health.

Art. 1.3: Dogs with eliminating faults such as e.g. unsound temperament, congenital deafness or blindness, hare-lip, cleft palate, substantial dental defects or jaw anomalies, PRA, epilepsy, cryptorchidism, monorchidism, albinism, improper coat colours or diagnosed severe hip dysplasia may not be bred.

#### 4.2 Registration of puppies with unhealthy parents

The national canine organisation can register with limited registration puppies from parents with severe hip dysplasia and/or elbow dysplasia, inherited severe eye diseases like PRA, congenital deafness, unsound temperament, severe respiration problems or other eliminating fault, whether or not mentioned as examples in Art 1.3. in FCI International Breeding Rules.

#### 4.3 Matador breeding and heavy inbreeding

Background - Art 3, FCI Breeding Strategies: To preserve, or preferably extend, the genetic diversity of the breed, matador breeding and heavy inbreeding should be avoided. Mating between siblings, mother to son or father to daughter should never be performed. As a general recommendation, no dog should have more offspring than equivalent to 5% of the number of puppies registered in the breed population during a five-year period. The size of the breed population should be looked upon not only on national but also on international level, especially in breeds with few individuals.

#### 4.3.1 Matador breeding

Limited registration can be used to prevent matador breeding, in accordance with FCI Breeding Strategy, Art 3.

Some national kennel clubs have registration restrictions concerning the number of offspring/litters from a single dog (male or female), to avoid decreasing the genetic diversity of the breed. If this number of offspring is exceeded, a limited registration can be used.

#### 4.3.2 Inbreeding

Limited registration can be used to prevent heavy inbreeding, in accordance with FCI Breeding Strategy, Art 3. Some national canine organisations have registration restrictions concerning heavy inbreeding: Mating between siblings, mother to son or father to daughter is not allowed. In some countries, mating with an inbreeding coefficient equal or exceed 25%, based on a six-generation pedigree, is not allowed.

If such mating is done, the puppies can be registered with limited registration.

#### 4.4 Dogs with hereditary diseases or functional disabilities

The breeder and/or owner can ask the national canine organisation to put limited registration on a dog that suffers from hereditary diseases or functional disabilities, included those mentioned above.

<u>The national canine organisation</u> can, without a request from the owner, put a limited registration on a dog that is suffering from severe hereditary diseases or function disabilities, included those mentioned above.

DNA-tests: A dog who is homozygote for a severe disease with autosomal recessive or homozygote/heterozygote for a disease with dominant inheritance can be registered with limited registration.

#### 4.5. Dogs with disqualifying faults

The national canine organisation can, with or without a request from the breeder and/or owner, put a limited registration on a dog with disqualifying faults, such as disqualifying coat colour, according to the rules of the national canine organisation.

#### The use of genetic tests in dog breeding

The Scientific Commission of NKU (Nordic Kennel Union) has worked out a strategy on DNA-tests in dog breeding, approved by the commission meeting in Iceland November 2014. It was decided on the NKU-meeting to send the document to both FCI Breeding Commission and Scientific Commission for further action within the FCI regarding the DNA-strategies.

The availability of genetic tests for different diseases in dogs has increased dramatically in recent years. For dog breeders and owners, the utility and accuracy of these tests are often difficult to assess. Even though DNA tests offer new opportunities as a tool for breeding, they also imply new questions and challenges. The fact that a genetic test is available for a disease in a breed does not automatically mean that the test is accurate or appropriate to use as basis for breeding decisions. The Scientific Committee of the Nordic Kennel Union (NKU/VK) would like to stress that genetic testing in dogs should be used with common sense and caution. The points described in the document should serve as *guidelines* for breeders and dog owners regarding the use of genetic tests.

The NKU document was presented to the Breeding Commission, and it was decided to send the following statement regarding the strategies, to the FCI General Secretariat, to make it available at the FCI website:

### Statements regarding strategies for the use of genetic tests in dog breeding

recommended by the FCI Breeding Commission, Dortmund February 13<sup>th</sup> 2015, based on a document from the Scientific Commission of the Nordic Kennel Union, November 2014

The FCI Breeding Commission fully supports the document made by the NKU Scientific Commission (NKU/VK) regarding the use of genetic tests in dog breeding.

We want to highlight the following statements from the NKU/ VK-document, and encourage the national canine organisations and breed clubs to make it available to all dog owners:

- The genetic testing in dogs should be used with common sense and caution.
- 2. A dog showing clinical symptoms of a serious disease should not be used for breeding regardless of genetic test results.
- 3. There is a need for further efforts from the international dog community to support dog breeders and owners with respect to validation and guidance on the use of genetic tests.
- 4. The FCI Breeding Commission advices against the use of genetic tests for conditions where the inheritance is unclear. Tests for diseases that are influenced by many genes should be applied <u>only in cases</u> where evidence based on scientific publications has established that the mutation(s) cause(s) a significant and defined risk of disease, and provided that the disease is of clinical relevance in the breed concerned.
- 5. The FCI Breeding Commission is reluctant to promote the use of multi-tests and combination test packages currently available. This position is based on shortcomings in validation and/or relevance for some of the mutations in the package as well as the potential negative consequences on the overall breeding goal that uncritical use of genetic tests is likely to cause. Instead, it should be recommended to the breeders and dog owners to test for the specific mutation(s) that is(are) relevant in the current breed, provided that these tests are validated.
- 6. The FCI Breeding Commission would like to emphasize the importance of breeders and/or dog owners carefully evaluating the usefulness and accuracy of a genetic test <u>before it is performed</u>. Only use the tests that are properly evaluated and for conditions of clinical relevance in the breed. No dog, or any other living creature, is completely free of disease mutations. Uncritical use of DNA tests may in the worst case result in negative effects on the breed's health and gene pool. Please contact your breed club or kennel club for more information if you are doubtful.
- 7. General statement
  - The FCI breeding commission fully supports the following statements from the Scientific Commission of the Nordic Kennel Union, concerning the general policy regarding the application of genetic tests in dog breeding.
- a. Genetic testing is an excellent tool in breeding for improved health, provided that the tests are reliable, relevant and used wisely. Breeders and dog owners should carefully evaluate the benefits and consequences of a genetic test <u>before</u> it is applied.
- b. A one-side or <u>exaggerated focus</u> on DNA test results may result in an <u>increased risk</u> that other important conditions or characteristics are overlooked.
- Breeding programmes should be based on the prevalence and severity of various health issues, rather than on the availability of genetic tests.
- d. If a disease does not constitute a clinical problem in the breed and/or the genetic test is not validated or accurate, it is better

- <u>to refrain from the testing of the dog.</u> Otherwise, there is a risk of excluding potential breeding animals and decreasing the genetic variation, based on uncertain or false grounds.
- e. Keep in mind that dog breeding is about more than specific diseases and genetic tests that, even though they are many, do not give the entire picture.

#### Import of puppies less than 3 months old

The Breeding Commission agreed to send this issue forward to the FCI European Section:

#### **Summary**

FCI should take actions against the new EU law that does not allow the individual member country to decide that puppies less than 3 months, unvaccinated against rabies, can be imported from just some EU countries (free of rabies); the new law says that if a country allows import from some EU countries, it has to allow import from all EU countries.

#### Background

Until late 2014, it was up to the individual countries to decide whether or not to give a permission to import puppies that were less than 3 months of age and unvaccinated against rabies. It was up to the government of the different countries to decide from which countries they would allow such import ("rabies-free countries").

According to the new rule, EU does <u>not permit to discriminate between countries</u> regardless the situation of contagious diseases; the same rules must be valid for all countries. If a national government permits to import unvaccinated puppies less than 3 months, the country will have to accept puppies from all EU countries, not only the "rabies-free countries" as has been done up to now. This will result in a much higher risk of importing contagious diseases, compared to the rules we have had until now. Consequently, most countries will probably not permit any import of puppies less than 3 month of age.

The background for the new EU rule is, to our knowledge, based on an attempt to reduce the risk of contagious diseases due to import/export of "street dogs" and from commercial puppy farms etc. It is now up to the national governments to decide whether to allow such import from all EU countries – or not to allow from any EU countries. The FCI Breeding Commission fully supports actions against import to reduce the risk of contagious diseases, but we find it very unfortunate that the only way to avoid import of puppies less than 3 months from countries with rabies and a high prevalence of other contagious disease, is to forbid such import from all EU countries, including rabies-free countries with low prevalence of other contagious diseases.

To maintain the genetic variation in dog breeds, import of dogs are of major importance. The new law will make import more difficult for the serious breeders and dog owners. It is a lot of work to socialise puppies from 8 to 15 weeks in a proper way, and we are afraid that conscientious breeders will refuse to sell puppies abroad due to this new law. It is not beneficial for a young puppy to be kept in a kennel with little socialisation until 15 weeks old. It is of uttermost importance for a puppy to be well socialised at early age; this is basic for the future welfare of the dog.

We encourage the FCI European section to take actions to make it possible for the national governments to make exception from the new rule: It should be allowed to import unvaccinated puppies less than 3 months, based on an application from the new owner and a statement from the breeder, from countries with no cases of rabies the last 5-10 years ("countries free of rabies") - without having to allow such import from all EU countries. To allow such import, the condition should be that the puppy is registered in the national canine organisation (or the breed club commissioned by the national canine organisation to register dogs and issue pedigrees) in the country where it is born. The national canine organisation to which the puppy is imported should undertake the responsibility to control all the import papers prior to register the puppy in its register. It will then be possible to avoid import of puppies from dog traders, as well as import of street dogs less than 3 months old.

It is of major importance for the organised dog-Europe that FCI now takes action in this matter, to help dog breeders and dog owners in Europe, and to show the member countries the strength of FCI as a the largest dog organisation in the world, working for dog welfare and genetic diversity in pedigree dogs.

### Keeping the original registration number when dogs are imported

The issue was raised by the Swedish delegate: Sweden finds it very important that dogs keep their original registration numbers throughout their life. It is a problem when the same dog has more than one registration number, when calculating inbreeding coefficients, breeding values etc. Norway is, to our knowledge, the only country that does not give an imported dog a new registration number.

The delegates agree that it would be beneficial to keep the original registration number throughout the dog's life, but it might be a problem in some countries, due to the computer systems.

The Breeding Commission decided to recommend the national canine organisation to keep the original registration number on imported dogs. If the current computer system does not support this, it should be integrated in the future new systems. The delegates will inform their national canine organisations about this recommendation.

### Decisions at the FCI General Assembly concerning proposals from the Breeding Commission

FCI Standing Orders, Art 8.3 (new text bold and underlined): On the original pedigree, the studbook registration number should follow the initials of the studbook in which the dog is registered (e.g.: SHSB: n° 255 333); in addition, the registration numbers and the initials should be provided for at least three generations. The type of coat, the colour and the size variety should be added on the pedigrees, including the export pedigrees.

GA decision: Approved.

FCI Standing Orders, Art 8.5 (new text bold and underlined): Any member or contract partner can refuse to (re)-register in its studbook, or alternatively can (re-)register with a "limited registration: not to be used for breeding", a dog suffering from

hereditary defects or featuring defects which go against Art 2 in the Statutes, or a dog which does not comply with the rules of selection defined by the member or contract partner in question.

GA decision: Approved.

FCI Standing Orders, Art 8.8 (new text bold and underlined): ... Each dog of a litter has to be provided with only one export pedigree, which must should include the name of the owner of the dog; if the owner's name is not written on the pedigree, a separate owner's certificate must be issued by the national kennel organisation.

GA decision: Approved.

Standing Orders, Art 8.9 (the proposed changes are bold and underlined): ...For each dog registered with an FCI member

or contract partner and then exported, the national canine organisation that last registered the dog shall certify the transfer of the ownership to the new owner by stating his name and address on the export pedigree or by issuing a separate owner's certificate."

GA decision: Approved.

#### Date and place for the next meeting

The Norwegian canine organisation kindly invited the Commission to have its next meeting in Oslo, May 28<sup>th</sup> 2016.

#### FCI FLYBALL COMMISSION - ACTIVITY REPORT

The main goal for the FCI Flyball community in 2015 was to finish the international regulations. During the first year of existence of the commission, the national differences turned out to be bigger than expected, so it was quite a challenge trying to combine all different rules into one international set. The main rules were, of course, very similar in all countries, but details prevailed in the discussions.

One of the main discussions was how the height dog should be defined. In Flyball, the jump height for all dogs of the team is determined by the smallest dog, called the height dog. Historically, the height at the withers had been used to determine jump heights, but several organisations in the world changed into a new direction over the last years. In this new method, the length of the forearm of the front paw is the determining factor for deciding the jump height. The length of the ulna bone is used in a formula to set the jumping capacity of the height dog. Not all countries were already using this method, but after the FCI meeting, finally, everybody came to a consensus. The formula was slightly altered, but in the new FCI regulations the length of the forearm is converted into a jump height.

All other discussions also found solutions and after the meeting of the FCI Flyball Commission at the DVG Schulungszentrum in Hemer (Germany). The final proposal for international Flyball regulations were sent for approval to the FCI General Committee. After a first discussion in Milan, the GC asked first for further information on the measuring method, which was provided by the commission. At the meeting of the FCI General Committee in Zagreb on November 13th, the regulations were finally approved.

During 2015, several countries applied with new candidates on the commission. There was a new delegate assigned from France and we got new delegates from The Netherlands, Hungary and the Philippines. At the 2015 meeting, it had already been proposed to host a World Cup of Flyball as soon as the regulations would have been approved. It will be the main issue at the next meeting, to develop a protocol for such international tournament. The next meeting of the FCI Flyball Commission will be held in Prague, Czech Republic, on March 19th 2016.

#### FCI EARTH DOG COMMISSION - ACTIVITY REPORT



#### Meeting

One meeting was held in St. Leonhard (Austria) on February 15th, which was attended by delegates from the FCI member countries. We had to elect the President and Vice-President of our commission. The delegates elected Steffen Maar (Germany) as President and Franz Gruber (Austria) as Vice-President.

We discussed 13 regulations for CACIT trials and sent them to the FCI General Committee.

#### FCI SHOW COMMISSION – ACTIVITY REPORT

The annual meeting of the FCI Show- and Judges Commission took place in Luxembourg, as usual, on the first weekend of February.

Mrs Gitty Schwab-Kersch, President of the Fédération Cynologique Luxembourgeoise (FCL) and her board members were the most perfect hosts and all delegates from 30 countries felt very welcome.



After very open and interesting discussions the following proposals were sent to the FCI General Committee. Most were approved:

Proposal 1: Regulations for FCI Dog Shows art. 3

The old text in the regulation art. 3: "If a show has to be cancelled because of force majeure, the organiser must partly refund the entry fees that have been paid"

should be changed into

"If a show has to be cancelled because of force majeure, the organisers are recommended to partly refund the entry fees that have been paid, based on their own existing rules." Approval of the General Committee.

Proposal 2: Regulations for FCI Dog Shows art. 5

The old text in the regulation art. 5: "Once the entries for a show have closed it is not allowed to transfer a dog from one class to another after the catalogue is printed except if an administrative mistake was made by the Show Committee"

should be changed into

"Once the entries for a show have closed, it is not allowed to transfer a dog from one class to

another after the catalogue is printed, except if an administrative mistake was made by the Show Committee." Approval of the General Committee.

Proposal 3: Regulations for FCI Dog Shows: Observer at World and Section Shows

Art. D, the old text in the regulations: "The FCI observer at World and Section shows is to receive from the organiser the same daily allowance as the judges, as well as his travelling, accommodation and meal expenses"

should be changed into:

"The FCI observer's expenses, incl. daily allowance, to be covered by the FCI."

The FCI General Committee does not agree.

However, they agree to add a clause stating that in case a visit, prior to the event, is asked by the General Committee, all the expenses will be borne by the FCI.

Proposal 4: the FCI should also provide a check list and time schedule for the observer visiting and preparing the show. Approval of the General Committee. TJ will take care of it.

Proposal 5: The Kennel Club (England) does not recognise champion titles from the Continent, which makes it very unattractive for English exhibitors to show on the Continent: the FCI General Committee is asked to get in contact with the KC to solve this problem.

The General Committee takes note of the request.

Proposal 6: Ban of showing, Art. 14: Every member and contract partner of the FCI is obliged, in accordance with its national legislation, to publish a list of all dogs, exhibitors and/or handlers who are banned from shows. All organisers are bound by this

Not all countries (member and contract partners) follow the rules.

The FCI General Committee is asked to investigate and send legal advice how to implement this article more effectively.

Yves De Clercq informs that the forfeit-list indeed is not respected by most countries. In addition, in case an exhibitor settles his account (entry fee), is the FCI going to confirm all the CACIB that were denied when he was not in order with payments? How about the RCACIB? The situation is very complicated and pretty much time-consuming for very poor effective results.

The General Committee decides to cancel article 14. The article 13 of the FCI Standing Orders which reads as follows is considered to be sufficient:

Article 13 - Penalties and sanctions

The FCI recognises all legally valid final sanctions (against any person, such as judges, breeders, exhibitors, handlers, etc.) notified to it by its members and contract partners and informs the other members and contract partners so that the sanctions can be applied in all the countries under FCI jurisdiction.

It is up to each NCO to send the names of all punished people to the FCI Office. That system is efficient.

Over the last few years, our commission has worked very hard on many articles of the show regulations. Most of the time, the General Committee followed our proposals and the actual Regulations for FCI Dog Shows can be downloaded from the FCI website. Our goal was to create modern show regulations, not only for Scandinavia or the rest of Europe, but also for the farther FCI countries, which are sometimes - because of their cynological background - a bit closer to the English or American way of organising dog shows. We do hope that now all FCI countries can follow these regulations easily, without any problems when organising international dog shows.

Dog Shows are one important window for the cynological activities and it might be of interest that in 2014, 8,204 international Champion titles were issued by the FCI and in 2015 a total of 990 CACIB shows were organised in 86 countries of the FCI world.

Dog people travel around the globe and it is nowadays easy to find exhibitors from Switzerland or any other European country at dog shows in Korea or the Philippines and vice versa.

But this causes sometimes big problems for exhibitors and organisers.

What is forbidden in Switzerland by animal welfare law is maybe of no interest in another country and again vice versa. How can we inform and teach our exhibitors around the world?

It is not only done with nice paragraphs and regulations in the catalogue. We all have to start in our home countries teaching future exhibitors, but also professional handlers, to respect high ethical rules and act as dog lovers. What has happened to the BIS dog at Cruft's and a group winner at the European Dog Show in Lillestrom should never happen again.

The FCI Statutes say it clearly under Article 2 Objectives The aims of the FCI are:

(1) To encourage and promote the breeding and use of purebred dogs, whose functional health and physical features

meet the standard set for each respective breed and which are able to work and to carry out different functions in accordance with the specific characteristics of their breed;

- (2) To protect the use, the keeping and the breeding of purebred dogs in the countries, where the FCI has a member or a contract partner; to support the non-profit exchange of dogs and of cynological information between the members and to initiate the organisation of shows, tests, trials and other activities like sport events, the use of dogs in rescue operations, etc.
- (3) To promote and support dogdom and dog welfare worldwide.

Let's work on it with great passion for our most beloved friends, the dogs.

Once again I would like to thank the Fédération Cynologique Luxembourgeoise for hosting our meeting. The warm atmosphere, the lovely dinner at the Château de Bourglinster and the very interesting bus trip to Schengen will always stay in our memories.

And last but not least my thanks go to Dr Tamás Jakkel for his support in the FCI General Committee, Yves De Clerq and his staff for the excellent cooperation and my colleagues Nick Schwab and Bojan Matakovic for their help and support.

The 23<sup>rd</sup> European Cup Trials for Hounds were organised by the Kennel Club San Marino, in collaboration with the San Marino Scenthounds, the Federation San Marino Hunting and the Italian Society for Hounds on March 7<sup>th</sup>, 2015 in San Marino and Italy. The event had the Patronage of the Ministry for Tourism and Sport of the Republic of San Marino.

#### FCI COMMISSION FOR HERDING DOGS - ACTIVITY REPORT



The last meeting of the FCI Herding Commission was in Amsterdam on 26-27 June, 2015. Delegates from Austria, Czech Republic, Finland, Italy, The Netherlands, Russia, Switzerland and Sweden were present. During the meeting, Luigi Cavalchini (Italy) was re-elected as President of the Commission, Jean-Paul Kerihuel (France) as Vice-president and Sandra von Erlach (Switzerland) as Secretary, all of them unanimously. The Natural Herding Aptitude Test NHAT was approved by the FCI General Committee. The Herding Instinct is a complex of hereditary characteristics and abilities, which makes a dog useful to control flock animals: interest in flock animals, willingness to cooperate with its handler, the drive to control the movement of the flock, the natural aim to search for the balance position opposite its handler in order to gain better control of the flock. Only training and experience will allow the dog to face more difficult trials, in which the most gifted dogs will be able to express at the maximum level of their natural aptitude.

The commission works on the revision of herding rules, revision to be completed during the next meeting. At the meeting, special attention was pointed out on animal care during herding training of dogs and about animal welfare.

The interest in herding dog activities, both collecting (Border Collies) and traditional (inter – breed) increased over the last few years and the commission pointed out this recommendation to the FCI member countries, with the purpose to practice this activity under the FCI umbrella:

- if the country does not have any representative in the commission, nominate a delegate with interest and experience
- adopting the FCI Herding rules
- stimulating the organisation of tests and trials under FCI rules
- controlling international trials following the FCI rules, promoting the education of new herding judges with specific background.

The next meeting will take place in Bergamo (Italy), on 10-11-12 June, 2016.

#### FCI OBEDIENCE COMMISSION – ACTIVITY REPORT



The FCI Obedience Commission had its annual meeting on 23-24 May 2015 in Prague Czech Republic). Representatives from sixteen countries participated; we are delighted, since the number of participants has been increasing. Efforts are made to increase the number of representatives in our commission and to spread the interest in dog Obedience sport.

One of the main topics at our annual meeting was discussing some details of and making some clarifications in the new Obedience rules and guidelines for classes I-III that are effective from 1.1.2016. Delightfully, most - if not all - European countries are applying these rules for classes I-III. In addition, most countries have a national beginners' class with exercises and judging criteria of their own, but probably well aligned with the FCI classes I-III.

As the World Winner in Obedience will not be tied to the World Winner Dog Show anymore in the future, planning and deciding on the sites of future World Winner competitions some 4-5 years ahead - and discussing the guidelines for arranging a World Winner competitions were important issues of the meeting.

The World Winner competition 2015 in Obedience was held in Turin, Italy, on 18-21 June. There were competitors from 21 different countries, of which 19 countries had sent a team. There were altogether 101 competitors. The judges of the WW competition were Gianfranco Giraudi (Italy), Christelle Nomine (France), Kjell Edström (Sweden) and Palle Bergsø (Denmark).

#### FCI SHOW JUDGES COMMISSION - ACTIVITY REPORT

As usual, our annual meeting was held in the first week of February. Our hosts were our colleagues from Luxembourg. We are grateful for their kind hospitality and for our memories of an educative, meaningful and agreeable weekend with a nice an unforgettable trip along the river Moselle, a visit to the European City of Schengen and a special Winery.

Special was the visit of our FCI president, Mr Rafael de Santiago, who paid tribute to Horst Kliebenstein (Germany) as Honorary President of our commission, with the first FCI Golden Pin. Once again, a big thank you to Horst who has lead this commission for a long time. He did this with great spirit, enthusiasm and knowledge.

Again it was a weekend with a lot of work and discussion in two committees that lead to several important proposals for the FCI General Committee. More and more non-European countries enter the Show Judges Commission and that is a great achievement. This is why both commissions decided to once have their meetings outside Europe in a few years. Only together we can make it work.

As every year, the FCI General Committee decided months after our meeting about our proposals, so a lot of time has been left waiting for answers. This time the proposals were discussed in the June meeting in Milan.

The proposals that were sent to the FCI General Committee were nearly all accepted. This is the crown on hard work and good preparation by all of us. Thank you all for your cooperation! However, we are not very happy with the fact that the General Committee did not motivate their rejection of some proposals (as the guidelines for writing reports on dogs). We asked the FCI General Committee to motivate negative decisions, but until now we have not received any feedback.

#### Joint Meeting with our colleagues from the Show Commission

Like every year, we organised a joint meeting with the Show Commission, also in Luxembourg. It is usually the last meeting in our weekend in which we talk about topics that involve both commissions. But we also inform each other about the specific topics that can have an influence on the other commissions.

#### Mutual recognition of judges by FCI and KC

The former President and former Vice-president of our commission discussed a concept statement in London, twice in 2013. This lead to a revised statement and some agreements that the two boards (FCI and KC) discussed further in 2015. It was surprising to read in social media and from a press release in Our Dogs that there has been an agreement between the KC and the FCI.

Of course we asked the FCI General Committee to explain this agreement. They informed us that the FCI agreed with the KC that they would write the document "clean" and send it to the FCI to be signed by the President. The FCI's intention was to inform the members and our commission immediately after

it was officially signed, but the KC decided to make it public without any signatures. Until now it is unclear if the statement has been signed by both parties.

#### **FCI Show Judges Directory**

The FCI approved to coordinate this website from January 1st, 2014. More and more countries participate in this international list and more and more organisers use it to develop their judges lists for shows. From December 2014, an English version of the Administrator's and User's manuals has been provided. This information was sent to the national canine organisations (NCOs).

#### Breed-specific education

Our aim to have a uniform education for every individual breed,  $developed \, by \, the \, country \, of origin \, of the \, breed for international \,$ use became reality. The FCI General Committee approved our proposal and sent our PowerPoint presentations to all NCOs with the request to develop PowerPoint presentations for all breeds. The FCI also decided to follow our proposal and published all the official PowerPoint presentations on their website. On Facebook, we got hundreds of positive comments on this action. Unfortunately, most countries have not answered our request to develop some breed education PowerPoint presentations. We also hope that countries finally start to develop these education PowerPoint presentations, because they are not only very helpful in educating judges all over the world, but they also give the opportunity to develop uniform education for your national breeds that can be spread over and used by the whole world.

#### Guidelines and instructions on how to write a dog's report

Throughout the last years, we often heard that judges had problems to write good reports on dogs when judging. Basic guidelines and instructions about how to write reports and a list of words that can be used would be very helpful. It would also give judges better opportunities to find their way at shows where written reports are asked.

We prepared nothing more than guidelines about how to write a report and developed a list of the most common words used. It is up to the FCI Countries to decide whether they use it in their education programme. The FCI Show Judges Commission submitted this document as guidelines and basic information about how to write a dog's report to the FCI General Committee.

Germany, France and Uruguay have finished the German, French and Spanish translations of the dictionary.

Without any motivation, the FCI General Committee turned down our proposal. We think this is strange, because we only want to assist our colleagues by developing guidelines to make judging easier and in a more uniform way! We asked to be send the motivation of this negative decision! However, we are free to use these guidelines in our countries to educate our judges! And some countries already do so.

### The matter of "supposed incorrect nomination of judges" in some countries

Since quite a few years, the FCI developed basic rules for education, examination and nomination of show judges and candidate show judges. These basic rules must be followed and respected by all FCI members. We are highly surprised to hear very intense rumours that the nomination of group judges does not always follow the basic rules. We now are in discussion with the FCI about how to control this and act when countries do not follow the rules.

#### Exaggerating dog feeding in the ring

This point was discussed in the joint meeting. Since a few years, it has become a "hype" to bait dogs big and small treats in the individual and main rings. Constant baiting leads to a different balance of the dog (high neck, different angulations and topline, bigger eyes staring, more wet lips), but it also affects its behaviour. The dog is only watching the hand holding the treat.

The FCI Joint Commission suggested that the FCI General Committee publish a circular in which the organisers of dog shows, the exhibitors, the ring stewards and the judges are asked to stop exaggerated dog baiting in the breed and main ring with no treats at all judgement or placement. The FCI General Committee turned down our proposal. It is now up to all our members to try to stop this exaggerating feeding in the ring by giving our judges and stewards guidelines.

#### Promotion of new judges

It was also discussed in the joint meeting the way to promote young and/or new judges to judge at international level. We worked on a proposal for the 2016 meeting.

#### Assisting members and answering their questions

During the year, we regularly get questions form members regarding interpretation of rules, education programmes, nomination of judges and assistance on seminars and events. We are always willing to assist, together with our colleagues from the Show Commission board. This year, we got several questions on the same matters, coming from the FCI General Secretariat, the FCI General Committee and our members and their countries.

In 2015, your president was invited by the Kennel club of Iran to inform their people about the structure and work of the FCI and of our commission. They organised a workshop for handlers and exhibitors regarding dog handling in the ring. They also organised a seminar for vets and students about the relationship between judges and vets and the way we can work together to get dogs that are good looking, healthy and fit for their function. Our President saw a lot of enthusiastic, willing and dog loving people in a country that is not yet that easy for dog lovers. However, the passion of the Board and its members will certainly lead Iran into a different way of looking at dogs.

In 2015, we were also involved with some FCI questions regarding judges coming from non-FCI countries to FCI Countries. We are glad that FCI asks our advice about the nomination of these judges.

The President, Vice-president and Secretary met once. Several topics were discussed by email and at shows. You will largely find these mentioned on the agendas of the commission.

We thank Yves De Clercq and his colleagues from the FCI General Secretariat for the way in which our documents were at all times promptly and correctly translated and sent to our members. Our thanks also go to the FCI General Committee member Tamás Jakkel, who supported and defended our proposals.

#### Contact with our members

We tried to spread new information as soon as possible to our members. During the last year, members received several mails regarding our actions. We have also already sent our minutes of the last meeting in April, so our members can undertake action in their own country when needed.

#### New Years' wish

Every year we do a lot of work developing statements, making rules, trying to uniform education programmes and to develop our way of judging in a way people around and in the ring can understand. We do this – all together – with a lot of passion and energy, with good and positive discussions and when going home after two days of meetings a lot of us go home with a lot of spirit to inform their NCO and colleagues about our work. But unfortunately, some of our proposals and agreements are not spread in our countries. A PowerPoint Education Programme can only work when we all take our responsibility to work on it. Statements and rules we develop can only work when we all spread them and also follow them. Our strength is that we prepare and develop a lot together. More strength will come when we not only dare act but also act together! This is our new years' wish for the present year!

Again another year that passed very quickly. A year in which social pressures on our dogs and on ourselves as show judges intensified considerably in many countries. We must jointly make strong efforts to promote fine, healthy, social and fit for function dogs. That will have to be a basic theme of our discussions and concerns in the coming years.

Now the work of the Commission will restart in 2016 with two main issues to be discussed:

- the Preparation of some revisions to the document approved in 2011 on FCI Sled Dogs Working Judges;
- the Preparation of the main lines of the document about regulations for the delivery of CACIT for sled dogs.

The next meeting of the commission will be held in Vilnius (Lithuania) on 21st and 22nd May 2016.

There were two meetings of the Utility Dogs Commission in 2015 (9-10 March and 23 September) in Delémont, Switzerland. I want to thank all the delegates who attended the meetings.

#### FCI-World Championship Tracking Dogs 2015

The FCI IPO FH WC 2015 was held from May 14th until 17th, in Yakhroma, Dimitrov, Russia, about 60 km from Moscow.

On behalf of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs, I want to thank Mr Sergey Zhirkevic and his assistants for the excellent organisation. We also want to thank the Supervisor, Mr I. Lengvarsky from Slovakia, and the Judges, Mr Toshihiko Mochiziki from Japan and Mr Mike Grueb from Switzerland, for their work.

33 participants from 17 different countries entered the competition.

FCI - Tracking Dog World Champion 2015 is Michael Tomczak with the German Shepherd Dog Aik vom Rio Negro, from Germany, with 192 points.

#### Results

1 x Excellent, 6 x Very Good, 11 x Good and 15 x Unsatisfactory.

The 2016 FCI-WC for Tracking Dogs will be held in Maribor, Slovenia.

#### FCI-European Open for Tracking Dogs 2015

Because of organisational problems in Croatia, there was no FCI-European Open for Tracking Dogs.

#### FCI-World Championship for Utility Dogs 2015

The FCI-World Championship for Utility Dogs 2015 was held in Delémont, Switzerland, from September 19th until September 22<sup>nd</sup>, with 127 participants from 36 countries.

On behalf of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs, I want to thank Mr Hans Peter Reich and his assistants for the perfect organisation of this WC.

The performance of the organisation was appreciated by the participants and the spectators.



The judges for this WC were: in Tracking, Mr Frederic Clemens from Belgium, in Obedience Mr Clemente Grosso from Italy and in Protection, Mr Robert Markschlaeger from Austria. Supervisor in Tracking was Mr Martin Gugler from Germany, Supervisor of the WC was Mr Wilfried Schäpermeier from Germany.

FCI-IPO World Champion 2015 is Jozef Adamuscin from Slovakia with his German Shepherd Dog Harysson Ad Gür, with 290 points.







#### Results

3 x Excellent, 40 x Very Good, 61 x Good, 3 x Satisfactory, 13 x Unsatisfactory, 4 x Reported ill and 3 x Disqualification.

There were 4 Starter with a, Wild Card". These participants were the 2015 Utility World Champions of their breed (Rottweiler, Dobermann, Dutch Shepherd Dog and Riesenschnauzer).

### FCI-World Championship for Mondioring Dogs 2015

There were two meetings of the Mondioring section of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs (February 23<sup>rd</sup> and October 10<sup>th</sup>, both in Vendenheim, France).

In June, the FCI General Committee accepted Mondioring as an official FCI Dog sport.

Further to this decision, we could have 1st FCI-World Championship for Mondioring Dogs.

This first FCI World Championship for Mondioring Dogs was held in Vendenheim, France from September 28th until October 3<sup>rd</sup> with 60 participants from 16 countries.

The FCI World Champion Mondioring is Bea Regg, from Switzerland, with her Belgian Shepherd Dog-Malinois Elvis von Hängelen City, with 348 points out of 400.

On behalf of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs, I want to thank Mr Bernard Roser and his assistants for the perfect organisation of this first FCI WC. The performance of the organisation was appreciated by the participants and the spectators. We also want to thank the supervisor Mr Valeer Linclau, from Belgium, and the Judges, Mrs Iris Remund, from Switzerland, and Mr Alfred Schot, from France.

#### FCI International Judges seminars

In 2014, the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs started with regional education seminars for FCI IPO Judges.

There are 4 Regions:

- Germany, The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, France, Israel, Spain and the American Working Dogs Federation
- 2. Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania
- 3. Austria, Switzerland, Poland, Hungary, Russia, Slovakia, Czech Republic, Japan, Taiwan
- 4. Slovenia, Italy, Croatia, Serbia, Greece, Romania, Bulgaria, Thailand and Malaysia

In 2015, the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs organised 2 seminars: one in Nova Gorica, Slovenia, and one in Vienna, Austria. These educational seminars aim at leading to a more homogeneous judging system of dogs and dog handlers.

Both seminars, with a theoretical and practical part, were successful, with a high number of attendees.

I want to thank the referents of these seminars, Mr Hari Arcon from Slovenia and Mr Robert Markschlaeger from Austria for their very good and appreciated work.

The theme of the seminars was: national and international judging according to the FCI Regulations.

On 18 October, the Vice-president of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs, Mr Wilfried Schäpermeier, from Germany, passed away. He was a great figure of dog sports, a great dog handler and a very valuable member of our commission, for many years. On behalf of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs, the President attended the funeral and brought the condolences of all the commission members to Mrs Schäpermeier.

At the meeting of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs held on September 23<sup>rd</sup>, the following decisions took place:

- the 2019 FCI IPO WC for Utility Dogs will take place in Austria
- the 2016 FCI WC for Tracking Dogs will take place in Ukraine

I want to thank all the delegates of the FCI Commission for Utility Dogs for their contribution and active work in 2015. I also want to thank the FCI General Committee for their positive support and acceptance of our proposals. It shows their appreciation of our work.

My special thanks go to the Executive Director and staff of the FCI General Secretariat for their excellent cooperation.

#### Letter of Understanding between FO and AKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The American Kennel Club (AKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between AKC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitely written with a view towards future cooperation;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the parties as follows:

- 1. AKCwill recognize the pedigree for any FO registry that meets AKCrequirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
- AKCwill not automatically give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries and FO will not automatically give exclusive recognition to AKCs registry in the United States.
- AKC will not register any dog born in an FOI member country until that dog has been registered in the Stud Book of the FOI registry or the AKC-recognised registry in that country. No dog born in the USA, belonging to breeds recognised by the AKC, will be registered by an FOI member registry unless the dog has been registered in the FOIrecognised registry in the United States. It is up to the FO to decide about the registration of dogs born in the USA belonging to breeds not recognised by the AKC.
- 4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (AKC judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
- 5. FCI and AKC will deal with the judging approval reciprocity in a separate document (see attachment).

- 6. AKC will not sponsor any event in the country of an FQ member without the express permission of FQ and the FQ member. FQ will not sponsor any event within the territory of the United States without the express permission of AKC. Puerto Rco is exempted from this provision as both AKC and FQ have been previously sponsoring activities on that island.
- 7. While not an FO member, FO has graciously agreed to permit AKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FO member organisations from taking part. If the AKC teams win the competition, they are not eligible for the title of FO Winner at these events.
- AKC registered dogs are eligible for the title of FO International Champion under specific conditions to be agreed upon by the AKC and FO.
- 9. Except with the agreement of the AKC, the FO will not register kennel names for breeders living in USA (with exception of Puerto Roc) and, except with the agreement of the FO, the AKC will not register kennel names for breeders living in countries where the FO has a member, which the AKC has accepted.
- 10. FO agrees to send to the AKC headquarters all revised breed standards and AKC agrees to send to the FO headquarters copies of its Complete Dog Book, which includes all AKC standards, each time that such publication is revised.
- 11. The terms of this letter of understanding is agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

#### Breed Judging

At FCI CACIB international shows, the AKC judges are eligible to judge and award the CACIB provided that the two following conditions are fulfilled:

- the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the AKC (this does not include FSS and Miscellaneous classes).
- the judges in question are allowed to judge, under AKC regulations, the breeds in question at AKC events and award them championship points. An AKC judge, residing in the United States, may not be approved as an FO judge (breed, group, all breed) eligible to award CACIB.

At AKC events, the FOI judges are eligible to judge and award championship points provided that the following conditions are fulfilled:

- the breeds they are scheduled to judge are recognised by the FOI and by the national kennel dub, in their country of residence, which has jurisdiction over the judges in question
- 2. the judges are members of their national kennel dub, in their country of residence, which is an FO member or contract partner
- the judges in question are allowed to judge, under FQ regulations, the breeds in question at FQ International CAQB shows and award them the CAQB

#### Group and BIS Judging

It is up to both, the AKC and the FO members, to choose to invite or not a judge to judge a particular group (according to FO or AKC breed nomendature) at an AKC event or at an international FO CAOB show taking into consideration the experience of the judge, his judging credentials and the breeds and their numbers in the groups to judge.

# Letter of Anderstanding between the Fédération Cynologique Internationale and the Kennel Club

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and the Kennel Club (KC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting, in the case of the FCI, pedigree dogs and in the case of the Kennel Club, all dogs; and

WHEREAS the parties hereto have in the past cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out this object and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose; and

WHEREAS it is agreed that the relations between KC and FCI and its member registries should be explicitly written with a view towards future cooperation;

NOW, this letter of understanding encompasses the mutually agreed basis for the relationship between the parties as follows:

- The KC, where it recognises the breed in question, will recognise the pedigree of any FCI registry that meets KC requirements and that wishes to have such recognition.
- 2. In so far as it is lawful, the KC will give exclusive recognition to the FCI registry in any country in which there are multiple registries provided that these registries meet KC requirements and the FCI will give exclusive recognition to the KC's registry in the United Kingdom. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.
- 3. The KC will not register any dog, or issue a pedigree to any dog, born in an FCI member country whose registry the KC recognises, until that dog has been registered in the FCI registry in that country. No dog born in the UK will be registered, or have a pedigree issued, by an FCI member registry unless the dog has been registered by the KC in the United Kingdom.
- 4. Each of the parties agree that when any information comes to its knowledge which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (KC or FCI judges suspension, amended standards, etc.), it will immediately communicate such information to the other party.
- The FCI and the KC will endeavour to agree on the conditions to make their respective judges eligible to officiate at events sanctioned by them (FCI and KC).
- 6. The KC will not sponsor or support any event for dogs in the country of a current FCI member without the express permission of the FCI member. The FCI will not sponsor or support any event for dogs within the territory of the United Kingdom without the express permission of the KC. For the time being this will not include Malta and China.

- 7. While the KC is not an FCI member, the FCI has graciously agreed to permit the KC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, Obedience, etc. Championship Event provided that this participation does not prevent representative teams of FCI member organisations from taking part. The KC teams may win the competition but are not eligible for the title of FCI Winner at these events.
- The FCI agrees to send to the KC headquarters all revised breed standards and the KC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters copies of all revised breed standards. The FCI and KC will discuss health issues connected with breed standards on a regular basis.
- FCI members are allowed to refer to the title of UK Champion by using the abbreviation "UK Ch + name of the dog".
- 10. Except with the agreement of the KC, the FCI will not register kennel names of breeders living in the UK and, except with the agreement of the FCI, the KC will not register kennel names of breeders living in countries where the FCI has a member, which the KC has accepted.
- 11. The terms of this letter of understanding are agreed to by the parties listed below. This agreement may be terminated by either party upon reasonable notification to the other party.

#### Memorandum of Understanding between FCI and CKC

WHEREAS the Fédération Cynologique Internationale (FCI) and The Canadian Kennel Club (CKC) share the common goals of promoting and protecting purebred dogs;

WHEREAS the CKC and the FCI have, in the past, cooperated to a certain extent in carrying out these goals and have been acting pursuant to certain informal agreements made from time to time for that purpose;

WHEREAS it is recognized that both the FCI and the CKC are required to operate within the limits of the legislation governing their activities, including their respective constitution and by-laws;

NOW this letter of understanding expresses a mutually agreed to basis for the relationship between the CKC and the FCI as follows:

- The CKC acknowledges the role of the FCI and its governing institutions as set out in the FCI Statutes as the primary world federation of dog registries.
- The FCI acknowledges the CKC as the primary kennel club in Canada.
- The CKC and the FCI agree that when any information comes to the knowledge of one party, which might reasonably affect or be useful to the other party (judges suspension, amended standards etc.), it will immediately communicate, in writing, such information to the other party.
- The parties will meet at the request of either of them, within a reasonable timeframe and on basis of a consistent mutually agreed agenda which will include matters of common interest.

- 5. The FCI agrees to send to the CKC head office a copy of all breed standards with revisions as they occur and CKC agrees to send to the FCI headquarters all CKC breed standards with revision as they occur. The FCI and CKC will also share information concerning the decisions of their respective governing bodies such as the exchange of official publications.
- 6. The CKC will periodically provide the FCI with a list of the registries from the FCI member countries with which the CKC has reached an agreement providing for the mutual recognition of studbooks and pedigrees. The CKC will get in touch with all the FCI members and contract partners and inform them about the procedure to follow to gain CKC recognition. The FCI will notify the CKC of the accession of any country to FCI membership.
- The details of a mutual recognition of FCI and CKC judges are written on a document which is part of this contract.
- 8. The FCI will not sponsor or sanction any event within Canada without the express permission of the CKC.
- The CKC will not sponsor or sanction any event in an FCI member country without the express permission of the FCI and the agreement of the member country.
- 10. While not an FCI member, FCI graciously agrees to permit CKC to participate in its World or Section Agility, Utility, and Obedience Championship Events and any forthcoming canine performance event that may be mutually recognized by both organizations.
- 11. As long as no agreement is reached with regard to the working breeds (according to the FCI nomenclature) between the FCI and CKC, these breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are not eligible for the title of "International Beauty Champion". The non-working breeds (CKC-registered dogs) are eligible for this title provided that they comply with the FCI International Championship Regulations, i.e. 4 CACIB in 3 countries under 3 different FCI judges.
- 12. The CKC registered dogs are eligible for the other FCI international titles provided that they meet with the FCI requirements.
- 13. The FCI international directory of kennel names (affixes) is not open to CKC breeders and the FCI cannot guarantee that a CKC kennel name (affix) will not be similar to an FCI registered kennel name (affix) and conversely.
